

# MERMAIDS' SWIM MEET TO BE HELD

## MRS. SWANZY PUTS UP TITLE CUP

The Women's Auxiliary at a meeting yesterday definitely decided to promote a one-night swimming meet for girl swimmers of Honolulu to be held some time in the month of February. This meet will be in the nature of a preliminary center to the big swim fest in April when mainland stars will compete here. Application for an A. A. U. sanction of the mermaid meet will be made at the next meeting of the Hawaiian branch.

It is expected that no less than 50 girls will take part in the mermaid meet. Swimmers from the Outrigger Canoe club, the Palama Settlement and unattached stars are expected to be in the events. In case the Hui Makani has been admitted by that time, there should also be Hui Makani swimmers in the races under club colors.

### Handsome Trophy

At the meeting yesterday, following the presentation of the suggestion of such a preliminary meet by Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, considerable enthusiasm was manifested. Mrs. Francis Mills Swanzy, president of the Women's Auxiliary, in a neat speech offered a handsome perpetual trophy to be competed for every year. This trophy will carry with its the title of all-round champion girl swimmer of Hawaii, and it is planned to engrave the names of the holders from time to time and thus perpetuate the memory of great girl swimmers.

Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo also offered a cup for the meet, to be a perpetual trophy. This trophy will go to the best school girl swimmer in the islands.

"Dad" Center, president of the Hawaiian branch of the A. A. U., commented favorably this morning upon the idea of a girls' swimming meet.

"I believe it would do a lot of good and help us to get the girls in form for the big April meet when they will have some hard competition from the mainlanders," he said.

### Likely Date

The majority of the members of the local A. A. U. appear to be in favor of the meet, so that there should be no difficulty in obtaining sanction for the tourney. It is probable that a games

committee, including the heads and leaders of various clubs, will be organized shortly to handle the details in connection with the mermaid meet.

No date has been set, but it is likely that February 23 will be the date selected. This will give all entrants plenty of time to prepare for the events. No effort has yet been made to secure the Y. M. C. A. tank, but it is felt that there should be no difficulty in obtaining it, as the "Y" authorities are heartily in favor of tank meets at all times.

## WAIKIKI STARS BEATEN THRICE
