

HUI MAKANI ADMITTED TO A. A. U. BY A 5 TO 4 VOTE

Waikikis, Braves and A. C. A's
Also Allowed To Affiliate
With Local Body

CHILLINGWORTH IS
DECLARED PROFESSIONAL

Honolulu Soccer League Also To
Be Informed Nine Other
Athletes Unregistered

BY a margin of one vote the Hui Makani Swimming Club was admitted to membership in the Hawaiian Amateur Athletic Union last night at a meeting of the board of directors. Voting was by secret ballot.

The Braves Athletic Club and the All-Around Chinese Athletes were unanimously granted admission and the Waikiki Athletic Club got in by a vote of 8 to 1.

This was the fourth or fifth time that the Hui Makani had applied for admission. The report of the investigation committee, consisting of Lorrin Andrews, O. P. Soares and Ralph Borden, stated that in the case of the Hui Makani, Soares and Andrews were in favor of admission but Borden felt that the club had not been on trial a sufficient length of time since their last previous application and voted against it.

G. S. McKenzie, who was present on behalf of the Waikiki Athletic Club, was compelled to answer quite a number of questions before the vote was taken regarding professional baseball. McKenzie replied that the two Waikiki ball teams have never played professional ball and explained that what was known as the Waikiki Stars in the recent series with the All-Chinese was a picked professional team which indulges in no other form of athletics.

Clubs represented in the balloting were the Y. M. C. A., the Outrigger Canoe Club, the Trail and Mountain Club, Palama Settlement, the Hui Nalu Swimming Club, the Healani Boat Club, - Kamehameha School, the Honolulu Athletic Club and the Amateur Athletic Union Club.

Sanction was granted for a long distance run to be conducted by the Trail and Mountain Club on February 21 and for an indoor swimming meet to be conducted by the Women's Auxiliary of the Outrigger Canoe Club at the "Y" on February 20.

On the ground that he had never applied for reinstatement as an amateur since his amateur card expired in 1913 and on the further ground that he has re-professionalized himself by playing against the All-Chinese baseball team recently, the board ruled that Henry Chillingworth was a professional athlete. The ruling was made in response to a letter from James A. Dunbar, secretary of the Honolulu Association Football League, asking for a ruling on the status of Chillingworth, who was not permitted to play last Saturday in a soccer contest because of his alleged professional standing. Registrar Ben Clarke was instructed to reply to Dunbar's letter giving him the necessary information and also giving him the name of nine other men on the Waikiki soccer team who are not registered athletes.
