

# Manoa Rainbows Tackle Surfers Next Saturday

The University of Hawaii and the Outrigger Canoe club football elevens will play the first big club game of the season next Saturday afternoon at Moiliili field. This announcement was made today by Manager Earl McTaggart of the varsity, who has been dickering for the game to fill the open date left in the varsity schedule when the Fort Shafter aggregation disbanded.

In Saturday's game with the surf-riders the collegians will be put to a severe test for the first time this season, and their followers will have an opportunity of seeing how they behave under heavy fire. In the service games played thus far Elliott's men have had everything all their own way, and at times they have displayed spurts of real high-brow football. If they are able to make the same sort of showing when they are hard pressed or on the short end of the score, they may manage to sneak over a victory on Withington's husky gang of beachcombers, but according to the sideline prophets, if they weaken for a moment they are lost.

## Outriggers Powerful

Certainly the Outriggers have a husky eleven, well drilled by one of the best coaches in the game. They have had the advantage of almost daily scrimmage with the Punahou team, and they are going into the game Saturday with the avowed purpose of avenging the 27 to 0 defeat administered to them last season by the varsity under Coach D. L. Crawford.

Elliott was not deceived by the varsity's overwhelming victory over the Luke field eleven last Saturday, and realizes that his men were not pitted against a first rate team. In yesterday's practise he returned to straight football, and kept the squad at it until dark. The one thing he is trying to guard against is over confidence.

The game Saturday will be played on Moiliili field and will start promptly at 2 o'clock, in order not to conflict with the interscholastic schedule, which is called for 3:30.

As a means of raising money for the swimming tank fund, the University Glee club is giving a benefit dance at the Outrigger pavilion on the evening of November 24. According to David Kapahakimohewa, president of the club, the affair is going to be the biggest stunt ever put on by the university. All students will wear green and white leis, which will be sold by the glee club members.

The sophomore class stood treat at the university Saturday night in celebration of the victory over the Luke field team, and gave one of the most enjoyable dances ever held on the campus.

Howard Kinney, the valuable little halfback, received another injury to his ankle Saturday after being in the game for less than one period. It is doubtful if he will be able to play again this season.

Dr. K. C. Leebrick is partly responsible for the pep which is being instilled into the varsity lineup. He is assisting Elliott in keeping the men in first class fighting trim.

Lionel Brash and George Bromley, last year's varsity halfback and fullback respectively, are reported to be the backbone of the Palama eleven, which is bidding for the New Year's Nevada game.
