

# Honolulu Soccer Association Holds Big Meeting That Gives Assurance of Splendid Season

## Footer Enthusiasts Pass Rulings That Assure the Amateur Status of All Players; The Season Opens Soon

Unquestionable amateur status of all players, certified to by the A. A. U., representation on the board of directors for teams through their captains and proxies of the captains; playing of games for the season at Moiliili Field and other important matters were among the things decided upon, or practically decided upon, at the meeting of the Honolulu Soccer Association, formerly the Honolulu Soccer Football League, last night in the banquet hall of the Commercial Club.

The first item of business for the Association was the election of officers. James Dunbar, secretary and treasurer, was elected by acclamation several times before he could convince the members that private interests would prevent his holding office for another year. S. J. C. Todd was then elected by an unanimous vote. W. Bell was chosen vice-president. Robert Anderson and J. C. McGill were selected by the members as members of the executive committee of the Association.

### Games At Moiliili

While it was not definitely decided, the consensus of opinion at the meeting was greatly in favor of accepting Moiliili Field as the locus for games of the league this coming season, which is expected to open about December 18. This matter was placed in the hands of the executive committee and officers of the Association for definite settlement, but it is a certainty that Moiliili Field will be chosen as the place for all games of the H. S. A. during the coming season.

It was decided that all members of all teams in the league must be certified to, as to amateur status, by the A. A. U. before they might be allowed to participate in any games of the Association. It was further determined that all entries must be made by a week from last night in order that the teams should be accepted by the executive committee.

In reporting for the sundry teams in the Association, Captain Bailey of the Outriggers, announced that that team would be composed of bonafide members of the Outrigger Canoe Club and that the club team would play under the red and white colors this year. Captain McKinley of the Healanis stated that his club's colors would be black and white. The Rangers, according to the statement of Captain Walker are to enter the lists wearing Royal blue and white. The All-Army team, as announced by the representative of Captain Morris H. Forbes, will be the wearers of the khaki.

### Name Chosen

After lengthy discussion as to the advisability of "parentheses" in the name of the organization, the title of Honolulu Soccer Association was definitely adopted by the members.

The visit of the British cruisers, H. M. S. Chatham and Calcutta, during the coming month was dwelt upon and it was decided that the officials of the Association might make arrangements for soccer games to be played with teams representing those craft.

A meeting of the officers and board of executives of the Association was announced for December 4th at the club rooms of the British club. Captains of the teams of the Association will be present at that time to represent their organizations.

The meeting was closed with a rising vote of thanks to President Fred Harrison for his donation of a silver loving cup to be put up for play by picked teams in an inter-island series. This cup will take the place of the Kennedy cup which was played for under like conditions and which it is now proposed to return to Hilo.
