

# SURFERS BEAT GREEN AND WHITE

## WITHINGTON MEN ARE STONEWALL

Fifteen to a goose egg is the story of the meeting of Dr. Paul Withington's Outriggers and the University of Hawaii football team yesterday afternoon on Cooke field, with the collegians on the blank end. The game was a practise scrimmage, but was equal to any game played this season on a local gridiron.

The score just about shows the comparative strength of the two teams as they appeared on the field yesterday. The heavy compact Outrigger line was practically an invincible barrier, which the collegians were almost never able to penetrate, consequently Withington's backs had little opportunity to show their defensive power. Jimmy Hart at fullback, however, met every play on the line and gave his forwards the finest sort of support. From end to end the Canoemen charged hard and low.

### Fought Tard

The varsity fought stubbornly

for every inch of yardage, and on the defense the line showed much improvement over any of their previous games, but the men still play too high, and were frequently brushed aside by their heavy opponents. The varsity backs played a poor defensive game, and with the exception of Thompson failed to meet the plays, but waited for them behind the line. Their defense against forward passes is particularly weak.

On the offense the varsity line-men were unable to open holes to any great extent, while the back-field interference was spasmodic and unreliable. The few first downs made by the varsity were made on a couple of well executed forward passes, and on skin tackle plays.

Neither quarterback showed any inclination to uncork anything but straight old Siwash football, with an occasional pass thrown in when the opposing backs played too close to the line to make bucking feasible. The Manoaites punted often on third down and frequently even on second, preferring to let the Beach-combers do most of the attacking.

### The Game

The first score came early in the game when, after receiving the kickoff, and working the ball up the field by a series of bucks, Parker dropped a neat field goal from the 35 yard line. The next tally was registered in the same period when Fuller intercepted a forward pass and ran 70 yards for a touchdown. The last touchdown was chalked up by Parker on an off tackle buck in the second quarter after the Canoemen had recovered a fumbled punt on the varsity 15 yard line. No attempt was made by the Outriggers to kick goal, as the time was limited.

This ended the scoring, all of which took place in the first half of the game. During the second half the ball see-sawed back and forth in the middle of the field with neither side able to gain any appreciable advantage.

The individual Outrigger stars were: Hart, Parker and Andrews in the backfield; Fuller, Hicks and Boyd on the line. For the collegians Thompson and Lambert were the best backfield performers, while Hanohano, Jacobson and Mott-Smith did good work in the center of the line. Nichols and Chang, two light varsity substitutes were sent in during the game, and although greatly outweighed by their opponents, they gave a good account of themselves.

A large crowd of spectators were present on the field, most of whom were Outrigger supporters.
