

# RAINBOWS IN BAD WAY FOR GAME

## CONANT IS CONSIDERED AS OUT GLOOM SETTLES OVER PILIPILI

Gloom, mingled with a feeling of dogged determination, has spread over the University of Hawaii campus. All the joy of victory occasioned by the walloping handed to Palama last Saturday has given way to despair and mourning. The trouble is caused by Coach Eliot's hospital list, which is entirely too long to be popular with the campus folks who hoped for another victory when the Varsity meets the Outriggers next Saturday afternoon in the third game of the major league championship series.

When the squad turned out for practise Monday afternoon a number of the first string men were absent, and several of those present were too badly banged up to participate in the day's workout. Ruttman, the big right tackle, is sick in bed with an abscess in the ear, and will probably be unable to play before the Waikiki game. King, Manohano and Lambert are all suffering from sprained ankles; and Lydgate has an injured leg which will probably keep him out of the Outrigger melele.

### A Question

Just what Eliot will do to bolster up his aggregation so that they can make a decent showing against the Outriggers is hard to say. He is working desperately to fill the gaps left in the line, and to patch Lambert and Conant up so that they can continue to perform in the back-field. Prof. D. L. Crawford is out working with the linemen so that Eliot can devote his time entirely to the backs.

Bob Macconel, who has been alternating with Searle at fullback, may be shifted back to his old position at tackle, and if this is done it will materially strengthen the line, for Mac is a strong aggressive player. Mott-Smith will probably replace King at center, and his place may be taken by Forbes or Nichols. Undoubtedly Eliot will be forced to use all of his second string men in the next two games, if he expects to meet Nevada with anything but a team of cripples.

### Not an Injury

What makes the prospects all the more depressing to the collegians is the fact that the Outriggers came through their mix Sunday with the Waikikis without a single serious injury. Saturday they will present an unbroken front coupled with a determination to run down the jinx which cost them their first game of the season against the Wacs. Moreover, the beachcombers realize that Saturday is absolutely their last chance to get a look at the New Year's Nevada game. If Withington's gang can walk off with the Varsity contest, and then beat Palama they will still have a chance at the New Year's game in case the Gilmanites are defeated by either Palama or the University. Last Sunday every member of the University of Hawaii squad who was able to walk, ambled down to Moiliili to see what he could see, and what he saw has not made sleep any better since. The Harvard style may be all right when you are used to it; but it does not look especially attractive as opposition to the collegian warriors.

"But we're not swamped yet," they all stoutly maintain, admitting at the same time that they are sailing with an awful reef in their mainsail.

Andrews will be in supreme charge of the handling of the assistants on the days of the games.
