

OUTRIGGERS WILL HAVE NO SNAP IN SATURDAY'S GAME WITH UNIVERSITY

Hawaii Supporters Expect Collegians To Win From Old-Timers By Superior Teamwork

"Who ever thinks the Outriggers are going to have things easy against the University is judging without seeing the 'U' in action," said a supporter of the 'Varsity last night in discussing Saturday's game at Moilili field.

"It is quite natural, of course, to expect the greater weight and experience of the Outriggers to count against the University, and of course they will count. But what will count more is the better condition and greater practice, which will be shown in the team work of the 'Varsity.

Has Faith In Team Play

"There is no reason to believe, because the Outriggers have a number of famous players in their line-up, and men who are not has-beens on the grid-iron, either, that they will have any great advantage, or any advantage at all, over Coach Elliot's men. In fact, I believe, for the reasons I have named, that the advantage will be the other way. A team of stars is not necessarily a star team, as has been proved time and again in baseball as well as football.

"Anyone who cares to go up to Manoa valley almost any day and see the drill, drill, drill, which Elliot gives his men will understand what I mean. He is making a football machine, and he has good material.

"It will not be surprising to me to see the 'Varsity not only outplay the Outriggers in the open, but hold their line as well. I believe the University will win by one or two touchdowns."

Varsity Coming Fast

This view is not at all uncommon among those who have been watching the work of the University through the season. Each game has shown such a decided improvement over the preceding game that the students are beginning to believe they will have the best, or one of the best, teams ever turned out at Hawaii. There is increasing confidence that Elliot's men will be able to take care of Nevada handily on Christmas day.

Outrigger admirers, however, cannot see how the less experienced and lighter collegians can cope with the eleven which Dr. Paul Withington will put in the field Saturday. They say that any weak spots shown by the Outriggers in the game with Waikiki last Sunday will be strengthened by tomorrow, and that while the University may have the advantage in condition, it will scarcely be able to withstand the power of the Outrigger attack.

The game is a crucial one for the Outriggers. If they lose it they are virtually out of the running for the Island championship, while if they win, despite their defeat by the Waikikis, there will be a chance of a tie and another chance at first honors.

Zimmerman To Referee

Officials for the Saturday game, which will begin at 3 o'clock, will be Zimmerman, referee; Midkiff, umpire; Von Holt, head linesman; Girdler and Dr. A. L. Andrews, timers.

Almost as much interest is being shown in the Sunday game between the Palama and Waikiki clubs as between the University-Outrigger contest. It is certain that one of the record crowds of the season, unless the weather is bad, will turn out to see Dusky Brash and his men try conclusions with Scotty Schuman's swift and husky Waikikis.
