The men's plunge for distance is also scheduled tonight. W. W. Harris, Jr., is the holder of the present record having made the 60 feet in 35 seconds last December.

The girls' relay race will also be a thrilling number. The Outrigger girls won in April and made a record time of 1:42.1 for 160 yards, thus breaking their own record of 1,43.3 made in February, 1920. The Outrigger Canoe club will thive two relay teams in the girls' race with the stars split up.

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There will be three Olympic stars: Ludy Langer, Pua Kealoha and Warren Kealoha in the 440 yards men's open event tonight and some of the dopesters are picking War-ren to win.

The best time ever made in the "Y" tank for distance was regis-tered by Norman Ross last De-cember when he covered the distance in 5:05.3, breaking his own tank record of 5:08.4 made in the

Illinois Athletic club tank.

The biggest crowd is expected tonight because of the century event and the fact that Duke is going to try for a new record. Furthermore, it being Saturday night, a great many who were unable to attend last night will be on hand.
