

SAGE HENS COMING ON SHIP MAUI

WILL MAKE ISLAND GRID HISTORY

PLANS FOR WELCOME COMPLETED

When Coach R. O. Courtwright and Captain Reed lead the University of Nevada football squad down the gang plank tomorrow morning at Pier 15 a new page will be written in the gridiron history of Hawaii, for this husky squad from the sage brush state will be the first mainland football aggregation to invade the local fields.

"How does Hawaiian football stack up against that of the mainland colleges?" has long been a point of heated discussion in local sporting circles, and that question will be answered at Alexander field, Puna-hou, on Christmas Day, when Coach Elliot's University of Hawaii lads meet the visitors in the first of two game series. The second game will be played on New Year's Day, but the local contenders have not been definitely selected by the committee in charge.

Outlook Bright

There are those who predict that the local varsity lads will be swamped by the visitors, but these are in the minority. The general opinion is that next Saturday will see the greatest football game staged that has ever been played in the Hawaiian islands. It will be the first intercollegiate contest, and one which will show what brand of football is really being played at the local university, which has

proved itself to be the best eleven in the islands.

The University of Nevada eleven is a strong, aggressive, hard-fighting team. A team which takes defeat only after the last effort and the last strategy have failed. It has gone through a hard season playing the strongest teams west of the Mississippi, and has lost games and won games, but in losing it is noted for fighting to the last ditch. It is a representative western mainland eleven.

The Hope

Among the visitors is one Jimmy Bradshaw, who has gained fame in the Pacific coast games of the season for his uncanny ability at running in a broken field, and in the use of the forward pass. Bradshaw is undoubtedly the sparkling genius of the Nevada eleven, and is expected to give Honolulu an exhibition that it will not soon forget.

The officials for the games have not been definitely chosen, but they will be selected from a group composed of Zimmerman, Midkiff, Withington and Gilman. A choice will be made as soon as the Nevadans have had a chance to state their preference in the matter.

Plans

The entertainment of the Nevada squad while they are in the islands is in the hands of the students of the University of Hawaii and friends of the university. The Outrigger Canoe club has also thrown its grounds and facilities open to them during their stay. A delegation from the University will meet the boat tomorrow and take the entire squad for a short drive around the city, ending up at the Outrigger for lunch, after which the men will be dispatched to the homes where they are to be entertained during their sojourn in Hawaii.
