

Kealoha Winner of the 100 Meter Backstroke: Americans Win 4 of 5

Great Britain Second at End of Day's Competition; Weismuller Takes 400 Meters in Rapid Fire Style

LES TOURNELLES, July 18.—United States swimmers won four of the five Olympic final events today, took three seconds and one third and piled up 59 points for a swimming total of 115.

Great Britain was second with 35 at the end of today's competition.

Warren Kealoha, Hawaii, won the 100 meter (109.36 yards) backstroke in 1 minute 13 1-5 seconds, a new Olympic record. The former record, 1:13:2-5, was made by Kealoha in the elimination trials. Paul Wyatt, Uniontown, Pa., was second.

Johnny Weissmuller, Chicago, won the 400 meter (437.45 yards) in 5 minutes 4 1-5 seconds, a new Olympic record. Arne Borg, Sweden, was second. Borg holds the world's record for this event at 4:59, made in Honolulu this spring.

AMERICANS WIN RELAY

The United States women's relay team won the 400 meter (437.45 yards) in 4 minutes 50 4-5 seconds, a new world's record. The former Olympic record was 5:11:3-5, made by the United States in 1920.

Miss Morton, Great Britain, won the 200 meter (218.72 yards) breaststroke event for women, a new

event. Her time was 3 minutes 33 1-5. Agnes Geraghty, New York, was second.

Elizabeth Becker, Atlantic City, won the women's springboard fancy diving with eight points. Aileen Riggien, New York, was second, and Carol Fletcher, Pasadena, was third.

MORE U. S. VICTORIES

The United States won the semi-finals of the 800 meter (874.90 yards, almost half a mile) relay in 9 minutes 59 2-5 seconds. The old record, 10:04:2-5, was established by the United States in 1920.

Sweden finished second and Australia and Great Britain also qualified.

The American women had the 400 meter race all their own way and Mariechen Wehselau, Hawaii, who swam anchor for the United States, finished 18 1-5 seconds ahead of the British last lap swimmer.

Gertrude Ederle, New York, handed Euphrania Donnelly, Indianapolis A. C., a five-meter lead and Miss Donnelly held her own. Ethel Lackie, Illinois A. C., gained a few meters. Miss Wehselau increased the lead without apparent effort, finishing 18 1-5 seconds ahead of the British swimmer.
