

Swanzy Cup In Competition Again

Women Swimmers Will Compete

Championships On September 26

THE Women's auxiliary of the Outrigger Canoe club has received a sanction to hold its annual swimming meet on the night of September 26 at Punahou tank. For the past four years the principal feature of the women's meet has been the Swanzy cup competition for the best all-around woman swimmer. In 1920 Gerd Hjorth scored two points more than Helen Moses, but as the latter has been a consistent competitor, she leads in the points now numbering 66, followed by Wehse-lau with 57 points and Dorothy Waters and Kuualoha Keliipio, each 13. The real object of the prize is to encourage swimming

in all its branches and calls for 100 yards freestyle, 50 yards breast, 50 yards back, plunging and diving, and is open to all registered women athletes. It is a fair test and very popular in swimming localities throughout the States and foreign countries.

Each year the high-point winner has her name engraved on the cup, but not until she has won it three years in succession does it become her trophy outright. The majority of swimmers specialize, and while they may be a champion in one particular stroke they can as easily be defeated in another, or the plunge and diving, and it is this angle of the all-around game that makes it interesting. Miss Wehse-lau, our returned Olympic star, has decided to enter again, and there is no doubt that Helen Moses, who got the high score last year, will try to get a second leg on the cup. We have many girl swimmers, and the prize is really within the reach of all.

These events excepting the diving will be considered the Hawaiian championships as well, in addition to which the program will include a number of territorial championships for men, probably the 100 freestyle, 100 breast, 100 back and the cup put up by the women's club for the 300 yards relay will be competed for again. Hui Nalu won it by a close margin last year. The committee in charge will soon decide what events will be included

for the service men and students of the public schools.

Mrs. W. A. Wall, secretary of the meet, has sent a note of congratulation to each of the returned Olympic swimmers, expressing the hope that they will enter one or more events and so give Honolulu fans a chance to welcome them back in local competition.
