COLORADO CLUB ORGANIZED HERE TO CHEER TEAM

Looks As If 150 Will Be In
the Stands Rooting For
Silver and Gold Outfit

From preliminary estimates submitted in connection with the organization of the Colorado club last night, the football eleven of the University of Colorado will have approximately 150 rooters in the stands at Moiliili field when it lines up against the winner of the Army-Navy game Christmas Day and against Hawaii on New Years.

Twenty-four members are included in the initial organization of the club. The number, it was announced, will probably be swelled by 75 to 100 members before the arrival of the Rocky Mountain conference champs Friday morning.

Dr. Robert B. Faus was elected president and F. Q. Cannon, secretary of the organization, which is to root for the Coloradans and incidentally provide entertainment for the visitors during their stay in Honolulu.

A committee was named to greet the visiting team off harbor when the President Wilson, which is bringing it to Hawaii, arrives Friday morning.

The way the races used to be held, so the old oldtimers say, was from the beach out to a boat beyond the surf and back again. The racers lined up with their boards in hand on the beach and at a given signal started, hit the water and paddled out and around the boat which was anchored at "Blow-hole." The first fellow to round the boat got the No. 1 position on the wave, that is, the extreme ewa end. The next fellow had to be Diamond Head of No. 1, and so on. They did not have to wait for all to lineup. As soon as a rider had rounded the boat he was eligible to take the first wave that came along. He rode the wave in as far as possible and then paddled for shore and the first one to reach shore won the race. The present races will be held in the smooth water in front of the Seaside hotel. They will be tests of speed paddling rather than a combination of paddling and wave riding as it used to be.

Seven events will make up the program and this includes two events for women. The finish line will be the Outrigger clock and the old diving stand. The start for the men's open will be Gray's raft. All other races will start opposite the Seaside pavilion.

The program is as follows: Men's open, girls under 15 years, men over 30 years, women's open, boys under 18 years, boys under 15 years, and relay race. In the relay race will be the Malihini team, captained by Russell Lowell Richards, and the Kamaaina team, captained by Gay Harris. Dawkins, Benny Co., Ltd., has put up gold, silver and bronze medals for first, second and third places of six events. Also individual silver medals will be awarded to each man on the winning relay team. The entries close one hour before the start of the races at 9:30 o'clock New Year's morning.
