

OUTRIGGER CLUB PLANS FOR EXPANSION OF FACILITIES

Plans for expansion and added stability for the future of the Outrigger club are announced in a circular letter to club members. This letter is also of interest to Honolulu generally because it has a bearing on the development of Waikiki.

The present Outrigger club lease on the property it occupies expires June 30.

The plan for the future includes a new lease of 25 years and expansion of club facilities.

The circular letter says in part: "After some four years of negotiation your building committee is able to report definite progress. We believe that shortly it will be possible to get an extension on the club's lease for a period of 25 years.

"To accomplish this, agreement has been reached by the trustees of the Queen Emma Estate and the Bishop Estate whereby land areas are to be exchanged, and new boundaries will be made in accordance with the map, copy of which

FROM LETTER WRITERS

Dear Bonnie Beach: Last week you asked for suggestions on improvements at Waikiki.

As a resident here for several months past and one who admires Hawaii greatly, but can see some defects, I should like to suggest a more frequent and careful cleaning of Waikiki beach.

The beach is small. Already it is somewhat crowded and will be more so as the visitors increase.

Daily cleanup of the sands is needed. Not only this, but screening

is on the main bulletin board of your club.

"Part of the plan necessitates the moving of the Ulunui club in its entirety to occupy approximately the position of the present Outrigger club's hau lanai.

Estates Will Absorb Cost

"Details for this have been worked out. The cost will be absorbed by the two estates involved. Under the circumstances the Outrigger club's first move will of necessity be the total elimination of those buildings now occupied by the commissary, directors room, kitchens, service kitchens, Waikiki beach patrol dressing rooms, our own laundry and drying rooms. We must move the canoe shed, surfboard lockers of the Waikiki beach patrol and private surfboard lockers of Outrigger Canoe club members.

Must Move Quickly

"We face the immediate and urgent necessity of working out a plan for the accomplishment of the above. All new moves must be financed, and where possible, made to coincide with master plans for ultimate development.

"The Outrigger club faces its biggest opportunity of many years. To fully take advantage of it, your club needs wholehearted cooperation."

The following special committees have been appointed:

Executive committee — Capt. James D. Willson, chairman; Leslie A. Hicks, Lorrin P. Thurston, L. A. Austin, C. W. Dickey, architect. Finance committee—E. R. Cameron, chairman; T. G. Singlehurst, R. Q. Smith.

Will Submit Budget

This committee will be charged with the duty of handling all financial details incident to the re-planning and re-building activities. They will submit a budget upon receipt of reports from subcommittees, outlining possible receipts from all sources, anticipated expenditures; possible sources of financial aid, operations and cost budget under the new plans, etc.

Committee On Women's Activities

Women's committee — H. A. R. Austin, chairman; Mrs. R. Q. Smith, Mariechen Wehslau.

It is the hope of the directors that the new building plan can be made exceedingly attractive to our women members, with the aim of materially increasing our membership. To accomplish this the committee should make a thorough study of all phases of our associated membership problem, based on present and past experience, and submit definite recommendations in writing to the executive committee.

Canoe, surfboard and storage committee—Clarence Dyer, chairman; Gay Harris, Sally Hale, Walter Macfarlane.

This committee will be in charge of the problem of relocating the canoe shed; replacing and rebuilding: (a) private members surfboard lockers; (b) beach patrol surfboard lockers; (c) beach patrol office and dressing rooms; (d) club owned canoes; (e) beach patrol canoes; (f) private canoes; (g) racing and stored canoes. Plans should contain recommendations to cover not only present needs but expanded needs of the future.

To Develop Sports

Games, sports development committee—Lindsay Austin, chairman; Dad Center, Gay Harris, Duke Kahanamoku.

May Increase Facilities

This committee will study the club's ground area with the idea of perhaps enlarging the scope of the club's present facilities to accommodate additional games such as handball, squash, horseshoes, etc., in addition to volleyball; also the development of other sports activities from a "plant" standpoint.

Managers and maintenance committee—Louis Haehlen, chairman; Ernest Cameron, George Perry.

This committee is charged with recommendations for the care and maintenance of the club, including the club's office and employed personnel needs; towel and suit washing and drying rooms and equipment; storage facilities for towels and supplies, parking space recommendations, etc.

Social facilities committee—Ernest W. Stenberg, chairman; Dr. A. L. Andrews, the Rev. Henry P. Judd, Mary Johnson.

This committee shall study and make recommendations covering all phases of our commissary department, club kitchens, club lanai and guest facilities, dance hall and pavilion problems.
