

# Attractive Program Listed For Meet In Punahou Pool To Honor Former Tank Stars

ASUH, Kamaaina Beachcombers Hui Sponsors First Annual Indoor Meet May 18-20—Hawaii's Swimming Honor Roll Carries Prominent Names

ORDER OF events for the Duke P. Kahanamoku Annual Indoor Swimming meet being staged under the auspices of the ASUH and Kamaaina Beachcombers Hui in Punahou tank on May 20 at 7 p.m. were announced yesterday. Trials in all events will be held Tuesday, May 18.

The 10-foot board diving event will be the first on the program which includes 19 events. The races are slated to start at 7:30 p.m.

Events include men's and women's open, men's and women's novice, races for both boys and girls under 14 years of age and a special relay between 10-man teams of old timers from the Outrigger Canoe club and Hui Nalu, each merman swimming 25 yards.

## ORDER OF EVENTS

Following is the order and type of events for the meet which is expected to draw a fast field of tankmen: 10-foot board diving, men, open, 10-dives; 220-yard freestyle, women, open; 220-yard breaststroke, men, open; 100-yard breaststroke, women, open; 100-yard freestyle, women, open; 220-yard freestyle, men, open; 50-yard freestyle, boys under 14 years of age; 50-yard freestyle, girls under 14 years of age; 100-yard freestyle, men, novice; 150-yard backstroke, men, open; 100-yard freestyle, women, novice; 100-yard freestyle, men, open; 100-yard backstroke, women, open; 200-yard freestyle relay, women, novice; 400-yard freestyle relay, men, novice; 300-yard medley relay, men, open; 400-yard freestyle relay, women, open; 400-yard freestyle relay, men, open, and special relay, OCC vs. Hui Nalu Old Timers, 10 men, 25-yards each.

An interesting study is to be found in the list of swimmers who have represented Hawaii on United States Olympic teams or have competed or coached aggregations which have competed either on the Mainland or in Japan. Nineteen swimmers from Hawaii have worn Uncle Sam's colors in the Olympics, while 28 more have either coached teams or competed on the Mainland or in Japan.

The meet is being staged with the idea of placing Hawaii in the swimming limelight again where it rightfully belongs.
