

Duke Entertains Big Crowd By Winning Fifty Yard Race In Twenty-Six Seconds

Nuuanu YMCA Takes Second Honors With 33 Points
To University's 45—Three Relay Records
Set—Desha Individual Star

THE Elizabeth Waterhouse Memorial swimming tank on the beautiful Punahou campus was filled to overflowing capacity last night in both the tank and the grandstands as all of Hawaii gathered to pay homage to its best known and most beloved of its sons—Duke Paoa Kahanamoku. The Kamaaina Beachcombers' Hui joined with the Associated Students of the University of Hawaii to put over the first annual indoor Duke P. Kahanamoku swimming meet and the show was a huge success from every angle. There was color, entertainment, old timers, novelty swimming acts, diving, nineteen regular aquatic events, the Royal Hawaiian Band, the Police Glee Club, hula dancers and then there was Duke himself with all of his swimming brothers.

Duke was introduced to the crowd as he came in just before the opening event and again by Charlie Chillingworth who related the days of Duke's Olympic triumphs—the victories in four successive Olympic games. But it was after the ninth event that Duke was at complete ease for then he took to the water and in the water Duke is King.

DUKE SHOWS OLD FORM

The Duke lined up with brother Sam and Gay Harris to stage a special 50 yard freestyle race. Gay was first off and then Sam followed a full second later. Another second elapsed and Duke dived in as the crowd roared out its approval at the form shown by the 47 year old youngster. Duke churned through the water like he did when he wore the colors of Uncle Sam against the world and he won his race. The 50 yards were clicked off in 26 seconds which is mighty good time for any swimmer.

Following their race the three stars put on a triple-oar act down the pool and came back in a triple-backstroke. It was a great show and well staged. Duke is the master showman in the water and gave the crowd many laughs with his sea-horse acts and dives from the side of the pool. Both Sam and the Duke appeared in the suits that they wore while swimming on the American Olympic team in 1924.

UH WINS TEAM HONORS

But back to the meet which was well staged and well raced in every event. Team honors were won by the University of Hawaii with 45 points, while the others finished as follows: Nuuanu YMCA 33, Roosevelt 30, Hui Makani 25, Palama 13, Waialua 9, Citywide A. A. 5, Hui Nalu 5, 40&8 Club 3, and Army 3.

The Guy Ballentine trophies for high point honors for both men and women were won by Alec Desha of the University of Hawaii in the men's class and tied for in the women's class by Betty Stevenson and L. Ensminger of Roosevelt.
