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to center all energies on victory in the civil war.

General approval greeted announcement from Valencia that General Jose Miaja had been re-appointed commander in chief on the Madrid front, with supreme military and civil authority.

Enthusiasm also was expressed over appointment of Colonel Vicente Rojo as chief of staff of the Loyalist armies.

Confirmation of Julio Del Vayo as war commissar and announcement that the government would suppress the "slightest sign of resistance" within its own ranks proved encouraging to Loyalist adherents.
