

Brilliande Named Executive Secretary of Coordinating Unit For Aquatic Activities

Organization Is To Function In An Advisory Capacity For Clubs Now Engaged In Marine Sports To Increase Interest

THE PROMOTION of public interest in water sports has brought about the organization of The Hawaiian Marine Sports Association, a group numbering many of the Islands' most public-spirited men and women, according to word received today.

Hawaii's great number of boating, yachting and fishing enthusiasts and the availability of exceptional weather and water conditions, compared to the lack of sufficient racing and competitive programs to create interest was laid as the reason for organization.

BRILLIANDE IS SECRETARY

At the organizational meeting, held at Kewalo Inn, Robert Brilliande was elected executive secretary, and asked to submit a program pending future elections for president and vice-president.

Asked what plans for the coming year are contemplated, Brilliande stated that a series of races in Honolulu harbor are to be staged, culminating in an annual Regatta or Race Week, such as held in other mainland maritime centers including Long Island, Portland and Los Angeles.

Besides organization of competitive yacht races between existing yacht clubs, outboard motor, cruiser and motorboat races, rowing regattas, outrigger and surfboard races and fishing contests are also scheduled, details of which will be revealed later.

"A COORDINATING UNIT"

"The Hawaiian Marine Sports Association is a public expression of a long-felt local need," said Brilliande. "The association does not intend to supplant already existing boating and yachting clubs. Our function is advisory and coordinating rather than dominating in nature.

"The general idea is to keep active clubs alive, arrange for awakening activity in dormant organizations, and organize new ones if necessary. Hawaii has been too long in the shadow of other nationally prominent yachting and boating centers," continued Brilliande. He went on to explain that greater competition among yachting, boating, rowing and fishing clubs would result in wide-
