

CLUB'S PLANS ARE INDEFINITE

Improvement plans for the Outrigger Canoe club remain indefinite with four building programs calling for expenditures ranging from \$10,000 to \$100,000 under consideration and with no program adopted yet to raise the funds, club officers pointed out today.

All plans are based on the proposed swap of property with the Uluniu Women's club, Thomas G. Singlehurst, treasurer, said. The Outrigger would give some of its land on the Royal Hawaiian side for the present site of the Uluniu, which adjoins the Diamond Head side of the Outrigger.

The exchange is pending in land court between the Bishop and Queen Emma estates, owners of the respective properties which the clubs lease.

Gain to the Outrigger would be a more regular shaped lot with longer beach frontage.

The more elaborate building ideas call for stores along the Kalakaua Ave. side, a new canoe shed, lounge, locker rooms and outdoor courts for squash, volleyball, handball and badminton. All the other buildings would be scrapped.

Simplest plan is to repair present buildings, taking over the Uluniu structure and to build that club a new structure in the new location, club officers said.

Architect C. W. Dickey has worked on the plans the last three years.

How the money to finance any of the plans will be raised is still undecided, Ernest Cameron, chairman of a special finance committee, said today.
