

Team Must Get Permit To Travel

Players Must Also Be
Registered Athletes
Before Sailing

SIX MEN ON SQUAD

Tony Morse Included In
List Booked To Sail
November 24

THE All-Hawaii basketball team, which plans to leave on November 24 for a barnstorming tour of the Mainland, will have to secure a travel permit and registration cards from the A.A.U., the board of managers of the Hawaiian association ruled yesterday at their regular monthly meeting held at noon at the Central Y.

Inasmuch as basketball is under the jurisdiction of the A.A.U., the proposed trip has been referred to the registration committee for action.

A similar tour was made last year without permission. Six players including Tony Morse, Town Team football star, have been secured for the team, which will be managed by Al Miller, who is already on the Mainland.

Applications for membership in the Hawaiian association were received from the following clubs yesterday and referred to the membership committee for approval: University of Hawaii, Outrigger Canoe Club, Kahuku Athletic Club, Matson Athletic Club, St. Patrick A. C. and the Kauai Athletic Union.

A vote on the foregoing applications was not taken yesterday because the board of managers deemed it wise to await the action of the National body which meets this week-end, on the proposed new Hawaii setup.

Ernest Lilley, who will represent the Hawaiian association at the National convention in Boston, was voted \$50 yesterday for hotel expenses. Lilley is an official of the Big Island Amateur Union.

The Alea A.C., suspended through an error during the '27 basketball season, was voted a refund of \$5 on its dues.
