Claim Promoter Failed To Carry Out Terms of Agreement Last Season

RECOMMENDATION that no further sanctions be given such as was granted last year to J. Ashman Beaven of the Honolulu stadium to stage football games in Honolulu between professional and amateur grid teams was made to the A. A. U. at the annual meeting of the Hawaiian association held at the Central Y. M. C. A. last evening.

The recommendation was made in the annual report of the registration committee, of which C. Dudley Pratt is chairman and the other members are E. C. Corn and Oscar Keller.

The reason for the action was, the committee declared, that Mr. Beaven did not live up to the terms of the sanction and has filed no report to show that he gave the entire net proceeds to the Elks' community milk fund, as he agreed to do before the sanction was granted.

SET DATES FOR ARMY SPORTS

Commenting on the action of the registration committee in making the above recommendation, Mr. Beaven declared today that there were no net receipts after expenses were paid.

"If the registration committee members want to investigate something, let them find out what became of close to \$5,000 that was paid to the local teams," Mr. Beaven said.

"I am not desirous of stirring up trouble, but if that is the way the registration committee wants to handle this thing, I will say that there was not an amateur on either team. After agreeing to play for 10 per cent of the gross, the local teams demanded more. I had the Green Bay Packers coming, was in a hole, and had to meet their demands. As a result the local teams got 50 per cent of all over \$15,000. The Packers got the other 50 per cent and by the time I paid all expenses nothing was left."

The section of the report referring to the pro amateur games, in which the Green Bay Packers were pitted against local elevens, follows:

"Twenty two sanctions were issued during the year. Only one of the persons to whom a sanction was issued has not complied with the rules and requests of the registration committee. This was in connection with the sanction given to J. A. Beaven, who applied for permission for the Green Bay Packers, a professional football team, to compete with the Hawaiian Football association.

"Upon authority of the national board of governors the committee granted permission for such a series upon the written assurance of Mr. Beaven that the entire net proceeds of the proposed games would be devoted to the Elks' Community Milk fund.

"However, although often requested to do so, Mr. Beaven has not furnished the committee with a statement of account and it is recommended that no further sanctions of such a nature be granted."

Rules Changed

The report of the registration committee showed that 1,039 athletes registered during the year and that there were 157 certifications. On recommendation of the committee the local A. A. U. association voted to have registrations of athletes run for a year from date of registration rather than to September 1 only.

The committee's recommendation was also followed in permitting athletes registered with one club for individual competition to transfer for basketball and volleyball only to another club on written request of the athlete approved by both clubs involved.

The clubs in the association so far are Outrigger Canoe club, Star-Bulletin A. A., Citywide A. A., Uluniu, Aloha Amateurs, Kilsby F. T. D., A. C. A., Hui Nalu, Army, University of Hawaii, Palama, 40 and 8 club and Nuuanu "Y" A. C.

The Nuuanu "Y" A. C. is a newly formed organization and was admitted to membership in the A. A. U. at last night's meeting.
