

PAUL FAGAN SENDS HIS OWN OUTRIGGER TO NEIGHBOR ISLAND

Sheriff "Bob" Lindsey Will Coach Huskies Who Promise to Offer Real Opposition to All Rivals in 1934 Regatta

WHEN the Milolii crews of Kona, the Outrigger, Hui Nalu and Queen Surfers' crews of Oahu and the paddlers of Hilo gather on Kealakekua bay, Kona, next summer for the big canoe races, they will find a new foe to conquer. The Island of Molokai, will be represented in next year's races, The Advertiser learned yesterday.

Paul I. Fagan, noted capitalist and sportsman, who played a prominent part in last year's regatta, has organized a band of huskies over Molokai way and before returning to the Mainland on the Lurline yesterday, following a short visit here in interest of his ranch at Puuohoku, Molokai, Mr. Fagan definitely announced that Molokai would be on hand at Kealakekua with several crack crews.

In order that the newly organized Molokai clubmen may get an early start in preparation for Kona's second annual regatta, Mr. Fagan shipped his valuable canoe, used by the Hui Nalus in last year races, to Molokai last Thursday.

Under Sheriff "Bob" Lindsey, the Molokai crews will start working out immediately. With the Kona races a long way off, training for the time being will be confined to the week-ends.

Many of the paddlers expected to comprise the Molokai crews are employed at the Fagan ranch which covers the entire east end of the Island.

The people of Molokai, according to Mr. Fagan, were very much interested in the races of last year which revived this ancient Hawaiian sport. When Mr. Fagan offered to provide the necessary equipment for Molokai to be represented at Kealakekua, the huskies of Molokai were quick to accept his offer. Mr. Fagan quickly ordered his canoe shipped and today finds Molokai paddlers anxiously awaiting the fall of next July when the second regatta will be held.

Higami To Feature In Mat Battle

Meets Billy Spendlove Tuesday in Civic Auditorium

"Professor" Higami, the Japanese "rubberman," returns to the mat Tuesday night and will feature a four-bout card at the Civic Auditorium, meeting Billy Spendlove, the Vancouver blond, a rough and tough little customer, with no neck and husky legs. The distance is eight rounds with 10 minutes to a round.

Higami has not wrestled here for two weeks, but last Saturday packed the Lihue armory on Kauai. He has yet to be beaten in Hawaii, but Spendlove believes he can take his measure. The match is sure to be rough.

Des Anderson tackles Joe Gunther in a six-round semi-final. Both are popular here and have good sized followings. Gunther's record is more impressive and he is favored to win.

Big fellows will show in the other two bouts. "Swede" Olsen goes against Sailor Schamp in a five-rounder, of six minutes to the round, while Walter Siros, a light heavyweight, meets Ernie Andrade.

Higami is popular here, because the Japanese fans turn out in numbers to cheer him, while fans of the other races apparently want to see him beaten.
