

# NO RECORDS IN TITLE EVENTS

No Hawaiian records were broken at the opening championship swims Saturday afternoon at the War Memorial Natatorium.

In fact, none of the winners even came close to the local records and that may be attributed to the inactivities of the Hawaiian splashers for the last five months. However, decided improvement should be shown in the next two meets.

Mildred Slight Hooper, leading woman swimmer here, came back to form to take both the 100 meters freestyle and 220 yards breaststroke events. Her time was slower by six seconds to Olga Clark's Hawaiian time of 1 minute 13.2 seconds in the century. She covered the furlong frog swim in 4 minutes 3 seconds, which is 22 seconds behind the standing time made by Jennie Woodd.

## Scored Easy Wins

Lack of competition may have been responsible for Mildred's slow times, she winning the 100 meters by more than six yards and coasting in to take the other event. A. Desha of Hilo, who won the event in the last meet, proved his consistency in taking the 440 yards breaststroke but he had an easy time, winning without any battle from B. Ceisler of Luke Field. Three of Hawaii's best mermen, Ah Kong Pang, Edward Park and Bernard Ho did not compete in this event.

Alvarez of the Harbor Defense won the diving event as was expected and another Hawaiian title was annexed by the same club when Tannehill and Waidlich finished the 100 meters freestyle in a dead heat. The time, however, was nearly six seconds behind Johnny Woodd's mark of 59.3 seconds.

## Good Exhibition

Two of the younger swimmers gave a gallant exhibition in the 100 yards breaststroke for boys under 16 when Williams beat Sakamoto after a neck and neck race. Both belong to 40 & 8 club. Joan Crawford of the Roosevelt A. C. took the girls under 16 100 yards backstroke swim.

Waialua A. C. under the leadership of Jennie Wood was figured to be a threat in the swims but due to misunderstanding on the time of the meet, the suburb team failed to show up. They thought the meet was to have been staged at 7:30 o'clock. They will have a chance, however, to compete in the next two meets.
