

"TOOTS" MINVIELLE WINS CASTLE EVENT TO DEFEND LAURELS

Veteran Shatters Record In Blue Ribbon Mile Race
By Registering 30.38. Over Hundred OCC and
University Natators Compete For Honors

MORE than 100 swimmers from the Outrigger Canoe club and the University of Hawaii joined forces yesterday morning at Waikiki to break six standing records of the annual O. C. C. Thanksgiving Day swim.

In all events the marks were broken by wide margins, with "Toots" Minvielle turning in the best performance of the day by winning the one mile Castle swim in 30.38, chopping more than three minutes off his record of last year.

Pawaa Team Downed By Hilo Shells; Score 9 to 6

HILO, Hawaii, Nov. 30.—The powerful Pawaa barefoot grid aggregation, champions of the Honolulu 135-pound league, were taken down the line here today by the Shell Oil eleven by the score of 9 to 6.

A placement kick for a field goal in the last minute of play by Tommy Kaulukukui, former Hilo High star quarterback, gave the Hilo gridders the victory, after everything was pointing toward a 6-6 tie.

The Pawaas scored their lone touchdown in the second quarter, but the Shells came back to even the count in the third period. Kaulukukui then clinched victory for the Hiloites in the last minute of play with a placement field goal.

Kaulukukui, captain of the local outfit, was the biggest star of the game.

Only swimmers from the O. C. C. and University competed in the six events, and both organizations gave sets of medals to their respective winners. In some cases, students swimming for both the "U" and O. C. C. won duplicate awards.

HEATH ON TOP

Francis Heath, swimming in the novice quarter-mile for the O. C. C., finished in 11:30 to break the old mark of 15:13.2. The first Rainbow finisher in this event was K. Murakami.

The intermediate quarter-mile, open only to the University swimmers, was won by Bernard Balch in 12:28, cracking the old mark of 13:47. Over the same course a few minutes later, novice women put up one of the most thrilling finishes of the day. Libana Furtado and Gertrude Howland, both from the "U," finished in a dead heat for first place. Their time was 12:30.3, as compared to the 14:00 mark of last year.

Another record fell by almost two minutes when Kiyoshi Kuramoto won the half-mile junior event in 19:24.4. He was closely pressed all the way by Adolph Desha, "U" freshman star, who swam alternately breaststroke, crawl, and backstroke. Rea, third in the combined event, was the first O. C. C. man to finish.

OLGA CLARKE WINS

Three old rivals put on a great race in the half-mile Public Baths swim for senior women, with Olga Clarke nosing out Mildred Slight Hooper and Gladys Slight. The time was 19:45.2.

A. E. "Toots" Minvielle, winner of the senior mile swim in 1924, 1929, and 1932, showed his familiarity with the course by nosing out the best paddlers from the University in his record-breaking show. Jimmy Hurd, Wilbur Craw, and Cedric Weight, all of the "U," followed closely by Hurd and Craw, also O. C. C. members, will receive medals from both clubs.
