FOUR TITLE EVENTS Four Hawaiian championship events are on the program which consists of 14 events. The titular compets are the 500-yard freestyle, 10-foot board diving, 100-yard breaststroke for women and the 220-yard freestyle for women.

The 200-yards relay open for women will also be staged tonight. In this event, teams from the Univer-sity of Hawaii, Citywide Athletic as-sociation, and the Outrigger Canoe club will vie for honors.

The diving will bring together in competition the leading divers of the territory. Heading the list and favored to win is Alvarez, of the United States army. Qualifying dives were held Tuesday night and the follow-ing besides Alvarez were picked for the finals: Greiner. Snyder, Campbell, and Gerywacz of the Army and Wil-

fred Oka of the University of Hawaii.
