

TRIO OF RECORDS SMASHED IN SWIMS

Lake of Army, Mrs. Hooper Set New Marks In Swimfest

RECORD breaking performances in two Hawaiian championship events and a new mark in a junior event marked the third swim meet of the Hawaiian A. A. U. championship series held last night at the University of Hawaii tank. At the end of the first three nights of the four-meet series, the University of Hawaii's men swimmers lead the championship division, with the Outrigger Canoe club women heading the women's championships.

The first record of last evening's program fell when the Army's classy sprinter, Lake, captured the 100-yard freestyle event in 56.6 seconds to shatter N. Hamada's old mark of :58.2. Mrs. Mildred Slight Hooper of the Outrigger club lowered the record in the 300-yard Hawaiian championship women's medley, with an effort of 4:39.4. This erased the previous mark of 4:50.6 set by herself eight years ago. Army's number one medley relay team accounted for the third new mark in the 300-yard event with a time of 3:18.2, breaking Hui Makani's old time of 3:25.4.

In the opening event of the evening, little Jane Hunter of Roosevelt high school won top honors in the one-meter board diving event for the women's Hawaiian championship.

POWERS WINS

Lt. Ben Webster of the Army, who established a new record of 1:09.4 in the 100-yard junior backstroke during the trials Wednesday night, did not enter the event in order to save himself for the 300-yard medley relay. Bernie Powers, University freshman, copped the race by three yards in the good time of 1:10.8, with Francis King, also of the University second. Kanoa of the 40-8 was third.

In the 100-yard breaststroke event for novice women, Miss Akimine of the 40-8 eked out a one-yard victory over Katherine Duncan of the University. The time was 1 minute 40 seconds.

FRESHMAN SHOWS CLASS

Adolph Desha, another University freshman star natator, swam true to form to win handily in the 220-yard Hawaiian championship breaststroke race, nosing out Masuda of the University and Pang of Hui Makani. Pang started the race in great style, holding a one-yard advantage for the first 100 yards. At the 125-yard mark, Desha and Pang hit the turn together and Desha led by one yard at the end of another 25 yards. At the 200 mark, Masuda was in second position, with Desha in front by eight yards. He held this margin until the end of the race.

LAKE COPS CENTURY

Lake of the Army turned in one of the unexpected record smashings when he easily outdistanced a classy field in the junior 100-yard freestyle to win in record time of 56.6 seconds. After the first 50 yards, Lake clung to a scant one-yard advantage, but opened up with his powerful stroke

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
