

Trio of Records

to win by six yards. Ammons, also of the Army, was second, with Bayne of the 40-8, third.

The following event, over the 300-yard Hawaiian championship medley course for women, saw Mildred Slaght Hooper break her own record by 11.2 seconds. The performance is remarkable in that she established the old mark eight years ago. After the 100 yards of breaststroke in the medley, Mrs. Hooper held a 15-yard lead over her sister, Gladys Slaght. At the end of the backstroke phase of the race, the lead had lengthened to 30 yards, and at the end of the event Mrs. Hooper's margin was 35 yards.

Tannehill of the Army turned in the biggest upset of the night with a great victory over Jimmy Hurd of the University in the 220-yard Hawaiian championship freestyle event. Wilbur Craw, also from the University, finished third in the race. Hurd set a killing pace during the early part of the race, leading by four yards at the 50-yard mark, seven yards at the 100 mark, and 10 yards at the 150. Hurd began to tire, and Tannehill pulled up even at the 200-yard mark to finish strong and win by three feet.

WIN NOVICE RELAY

University's 400-yard novice relay quartet won by 12 yards in a new event inaugurated last night. The time was 4:11. Inouye, Santoki, Uchiumi, and H. Aiwohi were the Rainbow swimmers. Army finished second and 40-8's first team third.

MISS CLARKE WINS

Another Hawaiian championship title for women went to the Outrigger wahines when Olga Clarke copped the century freestyle in 1:06.2. Mildred Hooper, also of the club, was second. In the next event, two University teams swept the first two places when other clubs failed to enter teams in the 200-yard junior relay. McKinley won the City and County novice relay event over the 200-yard course, with Makiki and Puuhale trailing.

Army's swimmers turned in another good performance with a snappy record-breaking win in the 300-yard medley relay over the championship course. They shattered Hui Makani's old Hawaiian record of 3:25.4 by more than seven seconds. Lt. Ben Webster swam the backstroke phase for the Army, followed by Waldlich in the breaststroke, and Lake in the freestyle. Second and third places were taken by the University's two entries. Army's margin of victory in the race was six yards.

UNIVERSITY IN LEAD

During the evening, the Rainbows from the University garnered 20 points in the Hawaiian championship division, while their Army rivals accounted for 15. Hui Makani won the lone extra point. Their efforts in last night's meet gives the collegians a six-point lead over Army with but one more meet to be held. In the women's championship race, Outrigger Canoe club won 17 points, and Roosevelt high school eight. Citywide A. C. and the 40-8 gained a single digit each. The University also leads in total points for the other divisions, having 89 points to Army's 58.

West Section Track Trials This Sunday

Trials for the west section Citywide track meet will be held at Kamehameha Field this Sunday at 1:00 p.m. If pre-meet interest is an indication of a successful trackfest this season's meet should be the greatest in Hawaiian track history. More than a hundred athletes have already signified their intentions to compete, and among them are several interscholastic and Junior-Hi letter men.

Bans on experienced track men competing in the meet have been modified, and the rules committee has thrown open the gates to interscholastic athletes that have not placed better than third in a high school meet. Entrants that have competed in A.A.U. meets are also eligible provided they have not scored more than a point in any meet run under direction of the A.A.U.

This year there will be two divisions in competition. Juniors any weight below 135 lbs. and seniors any weight above 135 lbs.
