of Webster, Waidlich and Lake, plowed through the water in the creditable time of 3 minutes 18.2 seconds. This time was faster than the former record held by the Hui Makani club by 7.6 seconds.

Army Trio Wins

The Army team nosed out the University of Hawaii team by about six yards. It was estimated that the Dean trio also finished faster than the old record.

A surprise was sprung in the 220 yard freestyle Hawaiian championship event when C. Tannehill of the Army squad paddled in ahead of John Hurd of the University of Hawaii. The time was 2 minutes 26.6 seconds. The record is 2 minutes 15.6 seconds, made by Johnny Weismuller when he competed here in 1922.

It was the most thrilling race of the evening and Tannehill just out-touched Hurd for the victory.

Close Pace Here

Adolph Desha of the University of Hawaii did exceptional work in winning the 220 yard breaststroke for men by about five yards from M. Masuda, a teammate. The time was 3 minutes 2.6 seconds. Ah Kong Pang, who holds the existing mark with 3 minutes 1.3 seconds, was third—less than two yards behind Masuda.

Olga Clark, representing the Outrigger Canoe club, had no difficulty winning the 100 yard freestyle for women. Her time was good—being 1 minute 6.2 seconds. Mrs. Hooper was second and M. Morse third.

With one more remaining the team competition remains anybody's. The University of Hawaii, coached by Theodore (Pump) Searle, scored 20 points, followed by the Army with 15 and Hui Makani one.

In the women's competition the Outrigger Canoe club is ahead with 17 digits, followed by Roosevelt with eight and the Citywide A. C. and 40 & 8 club with one each.

The Deans are leading for the three meets held so far with 89 points. Army follows with 58.
