Malola Kalili, great Hawaiian swimmer who returned a couple of weeks ago from the Mainland, was the outstanding performer of the evening, winning the 100-meter freestyle open and the 100-meter backstroke open.

In both races, Kalili registered creditable times. He annexed first place in the dorsal event in 1 minute 17 seconds and the freestyle compet in 63.6 seconds. He displayed fine condition and contrary to reports, his swimming days are far from gone.

WAY OUT IN FRONT

The Hui Makani established a huge lead over the clubs in the race for the team championship. Counting only the open events, Harvey Chilton's proteges corralled 22 points. Army was next with six points. Roosevelt, with Art Rutherford capturing second place in the diving tallied three points. Knute Cottrell's 40 and 8 natators scored two digits.

In the women's division, the Outrigger Canoe Club holds a 16 to 9 lead over the Citywide A. A.

Maurice Furucho of Hui Makani, adjudged one of the best distance swimmers in the islands today, won the 1500-meter freestyle swim after a bitter battle with Noboru Hamada, a team-mate. Furucho went into the lead from the outset of the race and kept increasing the lead inch by inch until the final lap when he had an advantage of approximately ten yards over Hamada.

In the final 100-meters, Hamada uncorked a brilliant sprint and began cutting down Furucho's lead until he was well nigh on even terms with about 25 meters to go.

At this point, however, Furucho began applying the pressure and met Hamada's challenge with flying colors to breeze in the victor by one yard.

Nakamura of 40 and 8 finished about 40 meters back of Furucho. J. Calosopa, of Citywide, entered the race but pulled out of the water at the halfway mark, after he had been hopelessly outclassed and outdistanced.

Furucho's time was 22 minutes 15.6 seconds.

DESHA IS SECOND

Adolph Desha, University of Hawaii student, gave Malola Kalili a stiff battle in the 100-yard backstroke open for men, the Hui Makani natator winning by two strokes. It was a close race all the way through. Kapua Harris of the 40 and
