

FURUSHO CAPTURES TOP HONORS IN 400 METER FREESTYLE

Hui Makani Makes Clean Sweep to Increase Lead for Team Championship—Olga Clarke Wins 100 Meters While Mildred Hooper Annexes 400-Meter Honors

MAURICE FURUSHO won his second race of the current Hui Makani outdoor swimming meet when he annexed first honor in the 400-meter freestyle open last night at the War Memorial natatorium.

Meanwhile, Olga Clarke, considered the best woman natator in the territory today, won the 100-meter freestyle open for women. Her time was 1 minute 14.6 seconds.

In order to accommodate fans who wish to see the parade in town this morning, the last of the three-day meet, dedicated to Tetsuya Hamada, who lost his life in the harbor recently, will start at 11 o'clock instead of at 10:00.

In conjunction with the meet, the annual mile swim for men and half-mile swim for women, sponsored by the Star-Bulletin, will be staged.

INCREASES LEAD

The Hui Makani continued to make a clean sweep for the team championship. Last night they annexed virtually every point in the open events, garnering 26 out of the possible 27. The 40 and 8 club registered the other point when Nakamura finished third in the 400-meter freestyle open.

After two nights of competition, Hui Makani has 48 points to six for the Army and three each for the 40-and-8 club and the Roosevelt A. C.

In the women's class, the Outrigger Canoe club is leading the Citywide team, 30 to 13.

Just as he did in the 1500-meter freestyle race Monday evening, Furusho jumped into the lead right off the reel in the 400-meter compet. Closely pressed by Malola Kallil and Noboru Hamada, team-mates, the Japanese distance star made the turn at the half-way mark about a yard in the van.

The three Hui Makani crack natators then put up a hectic battle for the lead, which Furusho fought doggedly to retain. For one reason or another, Kallil quit at the 300-meter mark, pulling himself out of the water.

GAME FIGHT

On the home stretch, Hamada challenged Furusho and put up a bitter fight. However, in the face of the powerful stroking of Furusho, his efforts were of no avail, the latter winning by two yards. Furusho's time was 5 minutes 18.6 seconds. Nakamura of the 40 and 8 was about 40 meters behind the leaders at the finish.

Olga Clarke of the Outrigger won the 100-meter freestyle open for women in 1 minute 14.6 seconds. Mrs. Mildred Slight Hooper gave her a stiff battle as did Margaret Morse of the Citywide.

This race was close all the way through and Miss Clarke managed to triumph by a close margin. Mrs. Hooper nosed out Miss Morse by half a stroke for second place.

Later in the evening, Mrs. Hooper came back to capture first place in the 400-meter freestyle open for women, stopping the watches at 6 minutes 33.4 seconds. Miss Morse of the Citywide was second and Betty Stevenson of the Outrigger Canoe Club third.

GOMES TRIUMPHS

Gomes of the Hui Makani won the 200-meter breaststroke open for men, with Dan Toomey and Philip Kane, team-mates, finishing in second and third places, respectively.

Gomes displayed great form and won handily. His time was 3 minutes 4.8 seconds.

The Hui Makani captured all places in the 300-meter medley relay open for men. The winning team's time
