Miss Clarke, Furusho And Nakamura Capture Star-Bulletin Swims

Olga Clarke, representing the Outrigger Canoe club, carried herself onward yesterday to a new mark in the half mile women's open swim, one of the three Memorial Day swim events sponsored annually by The Honolulu Star-Bulletin, with graceful ease and powerfully smooth strokes over the water at the War memorial natatorium.

Her time for the 880 yards was 13 minutes 6 8-10 seconds,

which bettered her last year mark by 11 8-10 seconds.

Miss Clarke started out from the very beginning to take the lead and with strong and smooth strokes, increased the lead as the race progressed. She finished 40 yards ahead of Mildred Hooper, also of the Outrigger Canoe club. Miss Hooper also swam a fine race and vainly tried to keep up with the champion, who finished the race with plenty of energy to spare.

Margaret Morse of the Citywide A. C. finished third.

The men's senior mile freestyle event and the men's junior mile freestyle event failed to produce new records, but the swimmers entered showed up well and all finished strong.

Maurice Furusho of Hui Makani copped the senior event and was timed in at 24 minutes and 16 seconds. J. Calosopa of the Citywide A. C. finished second and trailed Furusho by 140 yards. Furusho took the lead from the start and kept increasing the lead.

The junior event went to Ed. Nakamura of the 40 & 8 club. He negotiated the distance in 24 minutes, 35 6-10 seconds. He finished about 150 yards ahead of David Tai of the Citywide A. C. Rokuhara of Nuuanu Y. M. C. A. finished third. Like Furusho of the seniors took the lead and kept increasing it all the way.

Noburu Hamada won the 300 meter medley open for men in the time of 4 minutes 24.4 seconds. Hamada's freestyle ability carried him to victory in his final burst to the boards. Maiola Kalili was barely beaten by Diamond Martin for second place.

The 100 meter backstroke for women went to Mildred Slaght Hooper of the OCC over her sister, Gladys Slaght, and Miss Paulson of the Citywide. The race was close and Miss Hooper had to do her best to win in 1 minute 34.2 seconds.

In the high diving Eddie Alvarez of the Army proved himself again the class of the territory when he beat Arthur Rutherford of Roosevelt high school.
