Gene Sarazen Favorite In British Open

Tournament Starts On
Monday At Royal St.
George Club

NEW YORK, June 21—Experts and ordinary dopsters today picked Gene Sarazen as the best bet to keep the British Open golf title in American circulation.

Sarazen is regarded as the biggest threat in the tournament which will be played at the Royal St. George's club at Sandwich, June 25 to 29.

A Sarazen victory would bring the United States both of England's top golf honors. Lawson Little, Stanford University star, won the British amateur at Prestwick last month.

TITLE 10 YEARS IN U. S.

United States golfers have virtually made it a custom to win the British Open for the past 10 years. Not a Britisher has won the title in that time. Walter Hagen has been the most frequent American champion, having held the crown four times.

Sarazen won it in 1932 and Densmore Shute carried it away last year.
