Londos Throws Browning For Championship

NEW YORK, June 25—Jim Londos, bull-necked 195½ pound grappler, tonight threw Jim Browning, 233½ lbs., with a body slam after a struggle lasting an hour and 10 minutes, thereby gaining recognition by the New York State Athletic commission as heavyweight wrestling champion of the world.

Londos now becomes the first undisputed titlist in a decade.

With cat-like agility he escaped the vise of Browning's leg scissors and took a right to the jaw. Londos staggered momentarily and then seized Browning with a crotch hold and banged him to the mat, picking him up five times and crashing him to the floor before pinning him for the fall.

Coach Kaupiko of the Black and Golds said last night that he would drive his charges right up until and including Sunday, leaving Monday and Tuesday of next week for tapering off before the big events on Wednesday. Other coaches are expected to follow the same plan.

Crews from all clubs engaged in time trials Sunday morning. The girls from the Outrigger and Hui Nalu clubs were also clocked.
