## Dad Center Announces Tentative Outrig- ger Crews

LOCAL paddlers, prepar-  
ing for the big canoe re-  
gatta on the Ala Moana  
the morning of July 4, will  
hold their final stiff workout  
this morning.

Coaches of the three clubs,  
Hui Nalu, Outrigger and  
Queen's Surfers, announced  
yesterday that time trials  
would be held this morning,  
leaving but light drills for  
Monday and Tuesday.

Workouts will commence at 8:30  
and throughout the morning canoes  
will dot the Ala Moana channel.

### SELECT CREWS TODAY

Today's practice will also determine  
the tentative make-up of the various  
crews for Wednesday's race. While  
the majority of the coaches have  
already found their best combina-  
tions, there are several seats to be  
quickly awarded and these awards  
will be made following today's time  
trials.

The Center, coach of the Out-  
rigger announced his tentative line-  
up yesterday. While the veteran  
competitor is confident that his  
men will acquit themselves very fav-  
orably in the big races, he would  
not make a prediction of the outcome  
of the regatta yesterday.

### KEEN COMPETITION

Competition is keener this year  
than ever has been. The Hui Nalu  
and Queen's Surfers have powerful  
crews. Our boys will have to battle  
very hard of the way if they are  
to win any of the races," was Cen-  
ter's statement on the ensuing  
regatta.

"It's up to the boys," said John D.  
Dennis, Sr., coach of the Hui Nalu.  
"They are capable of winning; if they  
are the stuff, I believe we will take  
at least one of the events."

The Captain of the Queen's Surf-  
ers closed to make a statement.  
"We'll do our talking after the  
races," he said.

### TO TUNE UP MOTORS

The outboard motorists will also  
be in the Ala Moana this morning,  
tuning up their motors for the 25-  
mile race for The Advertiser cup.

Gray, one of the leading con-  
tenders for the title, stripped a cou-  
ple of gears in his motor in practice  
so may be forced out of the race.  
The boats watching, experts look  
to see John Abrams and Benny Lovell,  
and will see Jack Briscoe's motor,  
which is out for the title with  
Gray as the dark horse. Gray  
has a smaller motor than Lovell and  
Abrams. However, the boys in the  
crowd say that his motor is depend-  
able while some of the big motors  
are well known to peter out. By  
doing so in all three heats, Gray  
has a chance of gaining the crown  
title even if Abrams and Lovell  
are able to cover the 8 1-3 miles  
twice of the three heats.

The committee in charge of the  
regatta is preparing to accommodate  
a crowd of between five and 10  
thousand fans at the races Wednes-  
day evening. The first race is slated  
for 7 o'clock.
