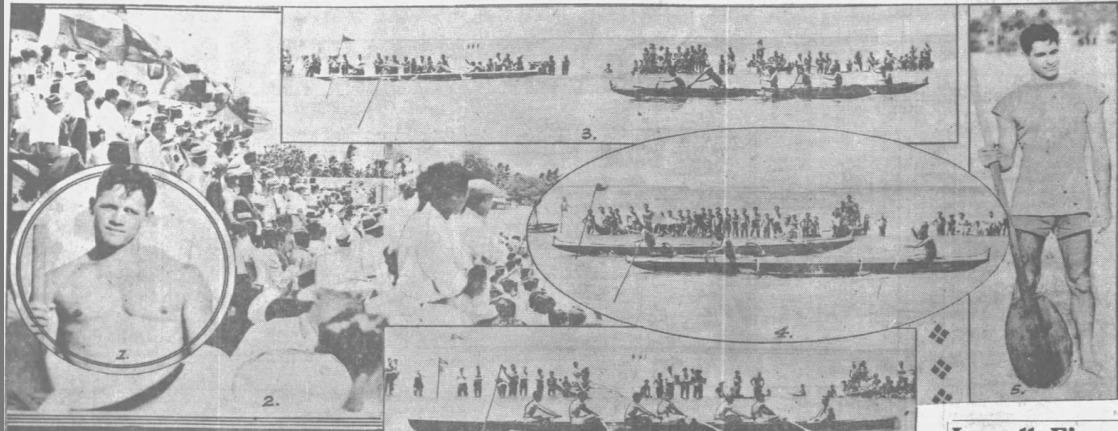


# STIRRING SCENES AT YESTERDAY'S REGATTA

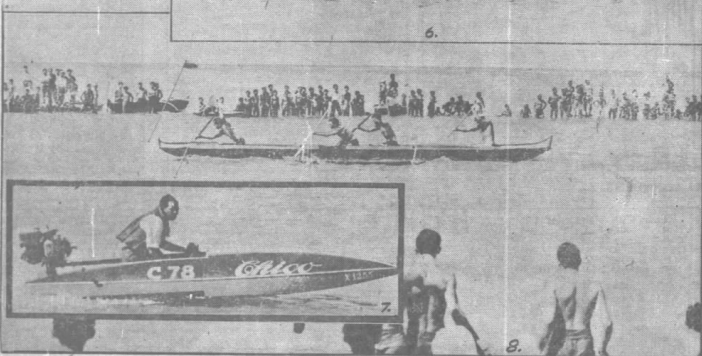

## Lovell First In Outboard Title Race

Defeats Abrams and Gray in 25-Mile Title Race

BENNY LOVELL, one of the ablest drivers in point of service, in a local outboard circles, won the Hawaiian championship yesterday when he piloted "Chico," crack craft owned by Jack Briscoe, to first honors in the 25-mile race held on Ala Moana channel in connection with the big canoe regatta.

Lovell defeated Terry Gray and Louis Abrams, who finished in 1st order named, to become king of local drivers.

A mishap on the third lap of the first heat when he burned a hole through the top of his piston, cost Abrams the championship. During the intermission between the first and second heats, Abrams installed another piston and after starting again early in the second heat, finally got going, coming back from five-minute delay to finish but a minute behind Lovell and returned later to beat both Lovell and Gray in the first heat he entered.
