Figuring that endurance will be the greater part of the battle, the Outrigger board of strategy marshalled the strongest group of youngsters in the club. With this material, Coach Center and his assistants have put in some long, hard licks. The only veteran in the senior six boat will be A. E. "Toots" Minville who stroked Outrigger to victory in the blue ribbon event of last year's regatta. "Toots" has been working on Molokai for the past several months but has managed to get himself into condition by working out with the Molokai crews.

Wholesale changes have been made in the Outrigger Senior six which bowed to Hui Nalu in the local races on July 4. The two-paddle crews will remain the same with Johnny Hollinger and Richard Beckert pulling in the senior and Bill Ryan and Louie Hale in the junior.

The Outrigger crews will sail on the same schedule as the Hui Nalu and Queen's Surfriders. This means that the seniors will leave on the Humuula next Monday morning and the remainder on the Coast Guard Cutter Itasca the following morning.

The Outrigger girls' crews will be selected later in the week as they do not leave until a week from today.
