Second Boatload Leaves For Classic of Islands

Fifty stalwart sons of Oahu will leave this morning on the Itasca bound for the Kong coast where they will compete in the second annual canoe racing classic Saturday morning against the pick of other island athletes.

This is the second boatload of local paddlers to leave Ho-nolulu. Twenty-five departed yesterday noon aboard the Humuula including Coaches Gay Harris of the Outrigger Canoe Club, John D. Kau-piko, Sr., of the Hui Nalus and Wil-lie Whittle of the Queen's Surfriders.

Today's party of oarsmen will dis-mbark at Keauhou, near Kealakekua Bay, where they will make camp with the Itasca standing by until the races are over.

Twenty paddlers from the Island of Molokai will be picked at Kaunakakai when the Itasca, under com-mand of Comdr. John Baylis, will stop just long enough to take them on board today.
