**G**RIMLY determined to return with not only the bacon but every last nightingale in Kona, Oahu's senior crews sailed at noon yesterday on the Humuula for Kona where they will establish training quarters for the second annual canoe regatta on Kealakekua Bay next Saturday morning. The remainder of the Oahu crews will leave on the Coast Guard Cutter Itasca this morning at 6 o'clock.

Sailing with the advance guard were the crack craft of the Hui Nalu, Outrigger and Queen's Surfriders clubs.

The Itasca this morning, will leave on the strike of six and those calling on her are warned to be on deck plenty early. The cutter will stop at Molokai en route to pick up Pump Searle and his Molokai paddlers. It is estimated that she will reach her destination at 7 o'clock tonight.

With the sailing of the Itasca, only the girl crews from the Hui Nalu and Outrigger clubs will be left here. The girls will leave on the Humuula on Thursday.

From reports reaching here from Kona, everyone and his brother will be on hand for Saturday's great pageant. Practically every reservation has been taken on the Humuula sailing Thursday. Accommodations are still available on the special excursion boat, the Waialeale leaving Friday night at 7:30. The itinerary for this excursion follows:

Friday, August 3, 7:30 p. m.—S.S. Waialeale departs from Honolulu for Napoopoo.

Saturday, August 4, 8:30 a. m.—Arrive at Napoopoo. The vessel will anchor in Kealakekua Bay close to the lanes followed by the racing canoes, affording passengers an excellent view of the races.

9 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.—During the races, refreshments will be served and an orchestra will play for the entertainment of passengers.

11:30 a. m.—Passengers disembark in the steamer's boats and land at Kawaloa (Cook's Monument), where a picnic luncheon will be served by stewards from the steamer Waialeale.

1 p. m.—Passengers again embark on steamer's boats for trip across Kealakekua Bay to Napoopoo landing where they enter numbered automobiles and drive to Honaunau—City of Refuge. After a short stop at Honaunau, the drive continues to the upper main road thence through Kealakekua to Huehue, cross the 1801 flow and continue to Puuwaawaa, thence return to Huehue to Kailua.

5:30 p. m.—Arrive Kona Inn. Dressing rooms will be available to passengers.

6:45 p. m.—Hawaiian luau at the Pavilion in Kailua Palace Grounds.

8 p. m.—Hawaiian pageant on Kailua beach immediately in front of the hotel.

9 p. m.—Public dance on special

## Favorites Triumph In Tournament

Play Now in Quarterfinals; Bob Hoogs

**T**HE Nuuanu Y Open tennis tournament advanced to the quarter-final round yesterday with the staging of four matches.

Favorites triumphed again, playing headsup game to turn back the determined challenges of their opponents.

Those gaining the quarter-final bracket were Bobby Hoogs, Lt. H. George Huff, Kauwila Akau, and Herbert Knudsen.

In the best and hardest fought match of the day, Knudsen subdued T. Suzuki, 9-7, 6-3. Both played a strong driving game and until the fifteenth game of the first set, they each won his serves.

But with Suzuki double-faulting twice and committing errors, Knudsen smashed through to win. Then in the sixteenth game, he won his serve and put victory away.

In the second set, Knudsen outplayed Suzuki to emerge on top at 6-3.

Bobby Hoogs, regarded as the strongest contender for the championship won last year by Edgar Yeoman routed Ted Landgraf, 6-0, 6-2. Hoogs proved too smart and experienced for young Landgraf.

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
