While the Outriggers have been established an early favorite, the crews of Kona, Molokai and the other Oahu representatives, Hui Nalu and Queen's Surf, are not without honor. The highest of esteem is held for all of these clubs. All crews are evenly balanced, and while the Outrigger is picked for first in the senior, it would be no surprise if the Queen's Surf-riders were the first across the line or the Hui Nalus or Molokai or one of the Kona entries. One thing is certain, however, that the regatta this year will be the greatest spectacle of its kind ever staged in Island waters. A record throng is already assured.
