

# KAILUA CREWS ARE REGATTA'S VICTORS

arrived earlier with members of the Honolulu and Molokai crews.

## Submarines There

The Naitamba, one of the yachts in the recent transpacific race, the USS Beaver and four submarines were also in the harbor.

Rush calls for raincoats and umbrellas were heard along the beach as an early shower fell and spectators hurried for shelter.

An Inter-Island plane soared out of the morning mists bringing Delegate L. L. McCandless, Lester Marks and Miss Peggy Hepburn of California to the races.

The Kailua crew won the first event of the day, the junior four paddle event, with Outrigger second and Milolii third.

## Hui Nalu Luck Bad

Hui Nalus ran into a bit of hard luck, being disqualified after finishing first in the second event of the day, the senior two paddle race. The Hui Nalus were ruled out for finishing in the wrong lane.

As a result of the disqualification of Hui Nalu, Kailua took first, Milolii second and Outrigger third. Hui Nalu was clocked at 7 minutes 26 and four-fifths seconds.

Getting off to a good start the Kailua paddlers were headed only once during the senior race, that being for only a few minutes between the second and third turns. They increased their stroke just before hitting the last turn to go into the home stretch and finished with a comfortable lead over Honaunau, second place winner.

Honaunau came from far behind after the race was one third over, passing Outrigger and Hui Nalu and for a time being a bit ahead of Kailua. The Outrigger crew finished in third place, Hui Nalu fourth and Mikolii fifth.

The fourth event of the day was the junior six paddle race in which the Outrigger and Kailua boats finished even. The race was declared a tie and the points for the first two places were divided between Outrigger and Kailua. Honaunau was third. This left the points as follows: Kailua 19, Outrigger 9, Milolii 4 and Honaunau 4.

## Two Crews Are Tied

The girls' race, the fifth event of the day, was won by the Outrigger Canoe club crew. Kailua finishing second and Milolii third. Milolii finished in the wrong lane, however, and was disqualified, which moved Hui Nalu up to third position.

The time was six minutes 38 4-5 seconds.

The senior four race, final event of the day, was won easily by Kailua. The Kailua paddlers took the lead early in the race and increased it until they crossed the finish line five lengths ahead of the second place boat.

Honaunau finished second and the Outrigger was third.
