

Kailua Crews Sweep Annual Canoe Classic

Senior Four—Kailua—S. Panewa, S. Solomon, F. Kamaka, T. Spinney.

Senior Two—Kailua—F. Kamaka, H. Simeona. (Hui Nalu finished but was disqualified.) Wilfred Paul and Howard Vierra were paddling for Hui Nalu.

Junior Four—Kailua—A. Akeo, J. Mano, J. Weeks, M. Krauhaiho.

Junior Six—Kailua and Outrigger tied for first—Kailua crew: H. Ake, J. Kinimaka, P. Caesar, W. Upehurch, R. Yates, J. Keawe. Outrigger crew: L. Chitwick, R. Dolen, H. Van Orden, George Perry, A. Wagner, Tom Ellis.

JUNIOR FOUR

Four paddle junior, Miloli jumped into the lead after Honanau had beaten rivals across the starting line. Hui Nalu challenged Miloli, but the Kona crew pulled away into a slight lead. Honanau and Outrigger raced

into a tie for second position as the turn was reached.

Four boats made the turn almost at the same time. Hui Nalu spun around beautifully and Outrigger made one of their spectacular turns. Miloli lost water as they rounded.

Outrigger snatched the lead from Miloli and Kailua swung up into second with Hui Nalu third and Queen's Surfers fourth.

Kailua swung into a boat length lead as the canoees raced to the finish line but Outrigger answered the challenge. As the three-quarter mark Hui Nalu picked up the stroke and sprang in an attempt to overtake Kailua. Kailua held to a slower but very powerful stroke. Outrigger clipped into third place as Hui Nalu shot into second.

Outrigger came back with a strong spurt and suddenly shot into the lead again as Kailua seemed to tire. Outrigger caught into a bad wave and the canoe swung around off the course. Kailua took advantage of the break and shot into the lead again, sweeping across the finish line a winner. Outrigger was second by two seconds.

Results: Kailua, 1st; Outrigger, 2nd; Miloli, 3rd; Honanau, 4th. Time, 12:18.4.

SENIOR TWO

Hui Nalu tried to get the jump and shot across the line ahead of the field. Starter Tom Forbes recalled the boats. Hui Nalu continued to delay the start and for the third time broke across the line. Once more Hui Nalu delayed the start try-

ing to get a big advantage on the start.

Kailua shot into the lead at the start with Outrigger following, but Kailua's powerful stroke piled up a huge advantage. After taking a one length lead, Kailua settled down. Entering the home stretch Kailua had a four boat length lead over Hui Nalu which swept ahead of Outrigger.

The field was well stretched out although Outrigger continued to lose water.

Kailua caught a wave and the bow turned to one side as Hui Nalu and Outrigger closed the open water. Kailua lost four seconds on this break and it looked as though Hui Nalu snatched the lead away.

The Honolulu crew continued to gain on Kailua as the Kona duo seemed to falter. The Japanese crew suddenly came into the fight and Outrigger came to life with a spurt as the boats raced to the finish.

Hui Nalu struck into the lead and passed Kailua, streaking to the finish line with a few length advantage. Kailua took second honors with Miloli and Outrigger fighting for third. Miloli was third.

Results: Hui Nalu, 1st; Kailua, 2nd; Miloli, 3rd. Time, 7:25.8.

The judges decided that Hui Nalu finished in the wrong lane and they were disqualified.

Official results: Kailua, 1st; Miloli, 2nd; Outrigger, 3rd.

SENIOR SIX

Kailua and Outrigger stroked into a slight lead with Honanau and Hui Nalu paddling about a half a length behind. The field settled down to the grueling pace, faster than usual and held to a sprint almost the whole way down on the first lap. A heavy surf was booming as the blue ribbon event started and it seemed to bother the crews.

The above pictures, taken at Kona yesterday during the second annual canoe competition, were rushed to Honolulu by the Inter-Island plane shown in the circle. Photo No. 1 displays a smiling Outrigger girls' crew resting on their oars preparatory to winning the fifth race. No. 2 shows the Kailua senior four, winners of the final event. The cheerful crowds in the center belong to A. E. Minville, in charge of decorations for the gala holiday occasion. The judges' boat is No. 4 and the pretty lasses in No. 5 make up the Hui Nalu wahine team. The Kailua girls, who ran close behind the Outrigger paddlers, and the Miloli toilers who lost third place when they finished in the wrong lane, are pictured in Nos. 7 and 8. Queen's Surfers dropped back as the stroke settled. Kailua held her lead as Hui Nalu and Outrigger raced bow for bow to the first flag. Outrigger caught a bad wave and turned off the course, another roller swung the bow further off. Hui Nalu and Kailua both suffered from this heavy wave.

Jockeying for position, Kailua hit the flag first, swung around beautifully and spurted away as Outrigger made a fine turn. Hui Nalu made a poor turn, apparently unable to swing around. Miloli got around nicely, but caught a bad wave and lost water. Queen's Surfers sped up on the boats as they turned towards the flag.

Kailua was well in the lead although Outrigger held her position in second, about a length behind. Miloli suddenly swept into the fight for first honors and challenged Hui Nalu and Miloli.

At the far opposite flag, Kailua was still a length ahead. Outrigger second, Hui Nalu third and Honanau fourth. Honanau staged a beautiful spurt to swing into fighting position. Kailua dropped her stroke, saving strength for the final spurt, and Outrigger and Hui Nalu caught the Kona boat with a quarter

of a mile to go to the flag. Honanau suddenly sprinted and passed the leading boats, apparently setting up a lead for the first time. Honanau held doggedly to her lead as Kailua again raised her stroke in a beautiful challenge.

Outrigger held Kailua even, Honanau reached the flag first and swung into the home stretch with a lead of one-half length, but Kailua made a sensational turn and regained most of her lost advantage, suddenly shooting into the lead again as the boats straightened out. Outrigger, Miloli and Hui Nalu followed closely. Miloli turned ahead of Napo-poo about 25 seconds behind the leading boats.

Kailua raised her stroke and suddenly her boat shot into a three length lead over Outrigger who caught the tiring Honanau boat.

A half mile to go, Kailua held a five boat length, Hui Nalu and Outrigger battling for second, Honanau came up in another challenge and as the three boats sprinted, Hui Nalu faded into fourth place a length back. Outrigger started the final spurt first but Kailua responded and held her lead. Honanau raised the stroke and passed Outrigger again as the

boats raced to the finish.

At the Waialeale and Itasca, 250 yards from the finish line, Kailua was still well ahead with Outrigger and Honanau racing gallantly for second position. Honanau shot ahead of Outrigger and challenged Kailua, but in the midst of their spurt, they caught a wave and turned off the course.

Kailua swept into the final sprint, relentlessly fast. Kailua swept across the finish line for her third consecutive victory of the day with Honanau second and Outrigger third. Hui Nalu was fourth, Miloli and Molokai following closely.

The official time was 18:01.8, smashing the old record by a big margin.

JUNIOR SIX

Seven crews got away together with Kailua apparently off to a poor start. Outrigger shot into the lead with Kailua coming up fast and sending her bow almost even to the Waikiki crew.

Hononau headed into the lead with Kailua and Outrigger holding on. Queen's Surfers challenged for the lead but the Kona crews and Outrigger remained slightly ahead at the three-quarter mark towards the flag.

Hononau increased her lead as Miloli spurred into second position and well ahead of Outrigger. Kailua picked up her stroke, trying to make it a clean sweep in four starts.

Hononau hit the flag first followed hard by Miloli and Hui Nalu. Miloli gained on Hononau with a well timed spurt just before the turn.

At the turn, Hononau swept around first but Outrigger's spurt gave her a chance for first. Kailua sprinted to the flag and made a beautiful turn. Hononau straightened out first followed by Miloli, Out-

ger, Napo-poo and Hui Nalu.

Hononau fell back in the gruelling sprint and Kailua with her typical spurt shot into the lead. Outrigger and Miloli picked up and passed Hononau and Napo-poo also came up on Outrigger.

Outrigger challenged Kailua, both crews picked up the stroke and the bows raced almost even. Outrigger held the spurt but Kailua seemed to fade under the bitter pace. Once more Kailua suddenly came to life, raised the stroke in answer to Outrigger and held a slight lead.

The battle for first seemed to be between Kailua and Outrigger with the rest out of the running for top honors. Kailua lost the lead for a second only to shoot back into the first position as the stroke was increased.

Outrigger's mighty challenge was again answered by Kailua and the beautiful Kona boat shot into a one and a half boat length lead.

Outrigger gained a length as Kailua was swept away from the course by a huge wave. The two bows were even as they raced 50 yards away from the finish. The bows changed positions with almost every stroke and shot across the finish line in an apparent dead heat.

The huge crowd was unable to determine the winner so close was the finish between Outrigger and Kailua. The field finished 30 seconds back of the winners.

The judges declared it a dead heat. Hononau third.

Results: Kailua and Outrigger tied for 1st; Hononau 3rd.

WOMEN'S RACE

Outrigger shot into the lead fol-

lowed by Kailua, Miloli and Hononau. Kailua trailed a length behind after the opening spurt by the powerful Kona crew seemed to be coasting along, awaiting for the crucial moment to challenge.

The other crews dropped back as Kailua and Outrigger raised the stroke in a race for first position. Kailua gradually closed the gap and pulled up a quarter of a length behind Outrigger with Hui Nalu and Hononau fighting for third.

Miloli got off her course and started for sea before straightening out.

Kailua's boat dropped back as Outrigger responded with a well timed spurt and again the trailing boat took up the pace with a length to the good.

Outrigger forged ahead as the crew raced for the finish but Kailua held on and Hui Nalu in third. Hononau shot into third place as Outrigger continued to gain. Kailua started a spurt as the boats neared the finish but Outrigger held to the lead and finished a good first, one and a half lengths to the good. Kailua was second and Miloli finished third but far out of her lane and was disqualified. Hui Nalu was given third.

Results: Outrigger, 1st; Kailua, 2nd; Hui Nalu, 3rd. Time, 8:26.4.

SENIOR FOUR

Outrigger leaped into the lead but Kailua, Miloli and Hui Nalu swept up on the leading canoe and made it a four way race shortly after Tom Forbes' gun sent the boats into the final battle of the day.

Miloli challenged Outrigger and went into the lead and Hui Nalu also passed Outrigger. Kailua picked up on OOC and Napo-poo and Japanese held on to the Outrigger stern.

Miloli answered Hui Nalu's spurt
