

ELECTED TO SUCCEED JOS. R. FARRINGTON AT ANNUAL MEETING

Defeats Bob Sawtelle, 8 to 4, in Ballot for Chair—
Art Powlison Named Vice-President—
Committees Appointed

OSCAR KELLER of the Army-Navy Y. M. C. A. was elected president of the Hawaiian A. A. U. at the annual meeting held at the Central Y. M. C. A. last night, succeeding Joseph R. Farrington, retiring president.

Keller who served in the capacity of secretary and treasurer of the local A. A. U. body last year, and Bob Sawtelle were nominated to head the body. In the vote between twelve of the thirteen clubs in good standing, Keller drew eight votes and Sawtelle four. The Aloha Amateurs were the only organization not casting a ballot.

In taking over the chair the new president stated that he only wished that he might be able to carry on his duties as well as Farrington had during the past year and that he hoped he would be given the same cooperation.

The board of managers extended retiring president Farrington a rising vote of thanks upon his retirement.

NAMED DELEGATES

Six delegates, Don Watson, Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, J. E. Hoch, O. Keller and C. Dudley Pratt were selected as delegates to the National A. A. U. convention which will be held at Miami, Florida, December 6. It is not known which of these delegates will actually attend the convention, some one generally being selected who is on the mainland at that time.

Their alternates will be Wilbur Wood, E. C. Corn, Capt. Lattimore, Theodore Searle, H. O. Pfaender and W. A. Cottrell.

The delegates at large for the coming year, appointed by the president, are Don Watson, A. A. Kempa, C. Dudley Pratt, E. T. Chase and E. J. Hoch. The delegates at large have a vote the same as the board of managers.

After a tie vote on the first ballot for the vice presidency chair between Arthur Powlison and Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, Powlison was elected on the second balloting.

YAP NAMED

Benjamin T. H. Yap of the All-Around Chinese Association was the unanimous choice to succeed Keller as secretary and treasurer for the ensuing twelve months.

C. Dudley Pratt, J. R. Farrington and E. C. Corn together with a representative from the Army and Navy will comprise the registration committee for the next year, the first three being elected unanimously on the first ballot.

The post of assistant treasurer will again be filled by E. T. Chase. The Central Y was again selected as the place of meeting by the A.A.U., the confabs being staged on the second Tuesday of each month at high noon. H. O. Pfaender and J. E. Hoch were selected to succeed themselves as chairmen of the swimming and boxing committees respectively.

The application of the Japanese-American Boxing club for a franchise was voted with Sam Ichinose serving as their representative on the board of governors. The Kilsby FTD franchise has been changed to the Elks club with Sawtelle as a member of the board of governors.

CHICAGO.—The football outlook in the Big Ten this season points to one of the closest battles in years for the conference championship.

Michigan, which has dominated the Big Ten for the past four years, promises to be knocked off its lofty perch. Several teams, notably Minnesota, Illinois and Iowa, are on the upgrade, and the fight for the title may narrow down to these three.

TEAMS TO BE STRONGER

Every team in the conference, with the exception of Michigan, and perhaps Ohio State, promises to be stronger than a year ago. The three teams, Chicago, Wisconsin and Indiana, which failed to win a conference game last season, all have better prospects for the coming campaign.

Two new coaches will make their debut in the conference this fall. Francis Schmidt, a Nebraska alumnus, who has had unusual success at Arkansas and Texas Christian in the Southwest conference, replaces Sam Willaman at Ohio State. Alvin (Bo) McMillin, who has developed fine teams at Centenary, Geneva and Kansas State since his playing days at Centre College, succeeds Billy Hayes at Indiana.

Bob Zuppke, beginning his 22nd year at Illinois, is the oldest coach in the Big Ten. Dick Hanley, starting his eighth season at Northwestern, is the conference's next oldest coach in point of service.

HOW THEY STACK UP

Thumbnail sketches of each team's prospects follow:

MICHIGAN—Tied for title in 1930 and 1931 and won it outright in 1932 and 1933. Wolverines lose eight of last year's regulars, and Harry Kipke will have to rebuild team from ground up. Material plentiful and Kipke can be counted on to get the most out of his men.

MINNESOTA—Favorite for championship. Unbeaten in conference last year, but played four ties. Only one man, Roy Oen, center, missing from last year's team, and sophomores and reserves are good. Seventeen letter men back.

ILLINOIS—"We'll be as strong as last year," says Zuppke. Last year Illinois missed a tie for the title by missing two points after touchdown, losing two conference games by 7-6 scores. Twelve lettermen back, with good material coming up from freshmen.
