

Oscar Keller President Of The Hawaiian AAU

Special attention to the development of swimming was the chief topic of discussion following the election of officers at the annual meeting of the Hawaiian Association of the AAU held last evening at the Central YMCA.

The attendance was the largest of any drawn by an annual meeting of the organization in years, and the general opinion expressed was that the new officers and committee should carry on along the same lines as the retiring officials.

Oscar Keller, secretary-treasurer of the association the past two and a half years, was elected president to succeed J. R. Farrington, retiring executive of the club. Keller defeated Bob Sawtelle in the vote for president.

Farrington was given a vote of thanks for the work he did during his two years as president and the new president pointed out that more had been accomplished during the two years than for any similar term in the past.

Arthur Powlison, director of playgrounds, was elected vice president while Benjamin T. H. Yap, representing the All Around Chinese Athletes, was unanimously elected secretary-treasurer.

E. T. Chase, who has handled the club's finances, was again named assistant to the treasurer. Chase's financial report showed that the association is in exceptionally good financial condition.

C. Dudley Pratt, E. C. Corn and J. R. Farrington were elected as members of the registration committee, the chief committee handling AAU work.

Delegate at Large

Thirteen clubs had representatives participating in the voting. In addition the president, with approval of the board of managers, named five delegates at large who were then added to the board. They are A. A. Kempa, Don Watson, C. Dudley Pratt, E. T. Chase and J. E. Hoch.

Delegates to the national convention, to be held at Miami, Fla., December 7-8-9, were elected as follows: Don Watson, Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, J. E. Hoch, C. Dudley Pratt,

Oscar Keller and A. A. Kempa. Alternates chosen were H. O. Pfaender, Theodore Searle, Capt. Lattimore, E. C. Corn, Wilbur Wood and Knute Cottrell.

The board accepted the report of the membership committee admitting the Japanese American Boxing club to membership. It was also announced that sanction would be granted to the Palama A. C. to stage an amateur boxing smoker on October 1, and that the University of Hawaii would sponsor the Hawaiian outdoor swimming championships October 5, 12, 19 and 26.
