

TRIALS SLATED FOR TONIGHT AT 7:30 AT MEMORIAL POOL

Two Hundred Swimmers Sign Up for First of Series of Hawaiian Outdoor Championship Meets—Army, Hui Makani, University to Be Strong

A FINE fettle as a result of diligent and serious training during the summer months, approximately two hundred swimmers, representing the best from both the service and civilian ranks, are prepared to vie for honors in the first of a series of four Hawaiian A. U. Outdoor championship meets Friday night at the War Memorial stadium.

Due to huge entry lists in some of the events, trials will be held in the evening at 7:30, it was announced yesterday by Theodore "Pump" Searle, graduate manager and chief body of which institution the events in which trials will be held are the diving, 200-meter freestyle novice, 100-meter freestyle for boys 16 years of age, and 50-meter breaststroke novice.

THREE-CORNERED FIGHT

The Army, 1934 indoor champion, the University of Hawaii, and the Hui Makani are looked upon to stage a three-cornered fight for the championship, with the 40 and 8 club which holds sway at the natatorium under the leadership of Knute Cottrel far out of the running.

The 40 and 8 club is a fast growing organization and has several promising swimmers on its roster. It will be particularly strong in the distance events.

The titular meets should decide a question of whether or not the army has a stronger aggregation than the Hui Makani. Ever since Uncle Sam's iron forces annexed the island title early this year in the University of Hawaii pool, with the Hui Makani natators conspicuous by their absence, there has been much argument pro and con regarding the merits of the swimmers of both clubs.

The Hui Makani did not enter in the meet, as Coach Harvey Child explained at the time, because its swimmers were not in condition.

NO FAIRER CRITERION

A fairer criterion as to the superiority of either organization will not be obtainable than at the upcoming meet, as the standard errors of the rival clubs will be a fine condition to put forth their best efforts as a result of careful training the past few months.

Since early summer, the Makani who boast of possessing the best civilian swimming team, have been working out regularly at the natatorium and at last reports appeared to be raring to go. On the other hand, the army swimmers just completed a profitable season in the Sector-Navy regatta and are in the best of form.

To garner points, the army will use Charlie Tannahill, Raynor, Aidich, L. A. Timberlake, Lake, L. Webster, Eddie Alvarez, diving champion, and a host of other veterans, while the Makani will use Maurice Furusho, Noboru Fuji Hamada, "Diamond" Marks, Barney Pung, and Bernard Ho as their nucleus.

Be that as it may, the University of Hawaii must not be neglected in reckoning the championship possibilities of the various clubs. With "Pump" Searle as its coach, the Rainbows have improved rapidly in the aquatic arena until today they stand well above the equal of any local organization.

SHOW PROMISE

Some promising swimmers have been developed out of Manoa way and can be evidenced from the fine showing made by Kiyoshi Kurashio, Adolph Desha, Bernard Owen, Wilfred Paul, Wilbur Lewis, Cedric Weight, and Jimmy Reid, in the indoor meet held at this year.

It is only a month since practice commenced at the University, but the collegians had been keeping busy by swimming regularly at the pool. It did not take them long to get into fine competitive condition.

Word from Public Baths way is that the 40 and 8 clubbers are also raring to go, as are the bywaters.

There will also be women's events at the championship meet and these races will feature Edna Slaght, Mildred Slaght Cooper, Olga Clarke, and Jean Pope of the Outrigger Canoe Club, and Margaret Morse of the City-Isle.

In the meet Friday night, there will be four championship events, 100 being the diving and 1500-meter freestyle for men and 400-meter freestyle and 100-meter breaststroke for women.
