Sanctioned by the local amateur athletic union, the University of Hawaii is sponsoring the titular meets and according to Theodore "Pump" Searle, graduate manager and swimming coach at the Mann institution, prospects for a highly colorful compet are extremely bright.

One of the features of the evening will be the three-meter diving for the Hawaiian championship. Entered in the event is Eddie Alvarez of Ft. De Russy, who won third place in the high diving in the last National A. A. U. Outdoor meet at Chicago.

### GREATLY IMPROVED

Alvarez has improved nearly a hundred fold since his last appearance here in the Hawaiian A. A. U. Indoor championships which were staged in the University of Hawaii tank.

Pushing Alvarez on to great efforts to retain his laurels as Hawaiian champion will be Ray Rutherford, Roosevelt High school star diver of last year; Morris of the 40 and 8 club, and Greizer, Snyder and Gerawacz of the Army.

Listed for this evening are three other Hawaiian championship events and they are the 150 meters freestyle for men and 40 meter freestyle and 100 meter breaststroke for women.

The 1500-meter race will bring together the outstanding distance swimmers of the territory when Kiyoshi Kuramoto of the University, who showed much promise early this year; Maurice Furusho and Noboru Hamada, both established stars of the Hui Makani; Bill Waidlich and Charles Tannehill, great natators of the Army, and Nakamura, Sakamoto and Giichiro Shiraki, budding stars of the 40 and 8 club, make strokes.

From start to finish, the race is expected to be close and exciting. All the swimmers are in the shape and are ready to give their all for victory.

### OLGA CLARKE TO SHOW

Olga Clarke, Gladys Slaght, Mrs. Mildred Slaght Hooper and Jean Pope of the Outrigger Canoe club; Miss Howland of the University, and Margaret Morse of the Citywide A. A. will be brought together for the 40-meter freestyle title race for women.

All the Outrigger swimmers and Miss Morse have had plenty of competitive experience and their respective abilities are well known to local aquatic fans.

For the 100 meter breaststroke Hawaiian championship for women, Miss Slaght, Mrs. Hooper and Miss Clarke are also entered in addition to Betty Stevenson of the Outrigger club and Rose Shimamura of the Citywide A. A. This race should be productive of heated competition throughout.

Although not listed as a championship event, the 400-meter relay open for men should be one of the hardest fought races of the evening. The University of Hawaii, Hui Makani, Army and the
