

ARMY TRAILS BY ONE POINT IN SWIMMING MEET AT NATATORIUM

Hui Makani Scores 8 Digits in Opening Compet of Hawaiian Outdoor Championships—Furusuo Wins 1500 Meters—Alvarez Wins Diving

HUI MAKANI established a one point lead over the Army in the fight for the Hawaiian A. A. U. Outdoor swimming championships last night when the first of a series of four meets was held in the War Memorial natatorium.

A crowd of more than 1000 saw Maurice Furusuo capture first place and Noboru Hamada second in the 1500 meter freestyle event, while Charlie Tannehill of the Army finished third, after Uncle Sam's lads had registered six points in the diving, to give the Hui Makani the edge, 8 to 7.

Cpl. Eddie Alvarez, stationed at Fort De Russy, who is regarded as the greatest diver to show locally in recent years and third place winner in the high diving in the last National Outdoor championships, won the 3-meter board diving with a masterly performance to grab five points for the Army, which team added another point to its score when L. Snyder annexed third place in the same event.

Art Rutherford, unattached, won second place in the diving.

In the battle for the non-championship trophy, the Hui Makani registered a commendable lead, scoring 40 points to 25 for the Army. The 40 and 8 club tallied 8 digits and the University of Hawaii three.

Besides the two championship events for men, a couple of titular races for women were staged, with Olga Clarke winning the 100-meter freestyle in 6 minutes 11.5 seconds and Mrs. Mildred Slight Hooper triumphing in the 100-meter breaststroke in 1 minute 47.3-5 seconds.

Furusuo displayed too much power and ability for both Hamada and Tannehill in the 1500-meter event. His time was 21 minutes and 53.3-5 seconds, and at the finish he was 40-meters ahead of Hamada and Tannehill trailing by 20 more meters.

Furusuo jumped into the lead at the outset and kept increasing his advantage throughout the race. For a time Hamada kept close to Furusuo, but the pace the Hui Makani veteran set was too much for him to match.

CLOSE BATTLE

For third position, Tannehill and Nakamura of 40 and 8 staged a close race until the final 500 meters, when the Army star asserted himself and annexed the honor by a goodly margin.

Although trailing by nearly a hundred meters, Ranor of the Army and Shiraki of 40 and 8 staged a bitter battle for fifth place. By virtue of a burst of speed in the last 25 meters of the race, Shiraki nosed his rival out by two meters.

Olga Clarke won by 40 meters in the 400 meter freestyle Hawaiian championship for women from Rachael Howland of the University of Hawaii. Gladys Slight was third.

MRS. HOOPER ON TOP

Only two swimmers competed in the 100 meter breaststroke Hawaiian championship for women. Mrs. Mildred Slight Hooper won first place with Betty Stevenson second.
