

MAKANI SWIMMERS INCREASE LEAD IN RACE FOR GONFALON

Army Trailing by 17 to 7 Points—Hui Makani Annexes All Three Places in Medley Title Event
—Olga Clarke Wins Two Events

NOBORU HAMADA of the Hui Makani turned the tables on his team mate, Maurice Furu^{sho}, who beat him in the 1500 meter freestyle a week ago, in the second meet of the annual Hawaiian A. A. U. Outdoor swimming championships, when he won the 300-meter individual medley Hawaiian championship event last night in the War Memorial Natatorium.

With Diamond Martin nosing out Adolph Desha of the University of Hawaii, with a powerful sprint in the freestyle for third place, the Hui Makani annexed all three places in the event, which was the only titular event for men to be held last evening.

Hui Makani, as a result, increased their one-point lead over the Army in the struggle for the team championship. They now have 17 points to seven for the Sector natators. The other clubs have not as yet won a single point in the titular races.

Olga Clarke, of the Outrigger Canoe Club, peerless local mermaid, captured two women's championships last night when she showed her heels to the field in the 800 meter freestyle and the 100-meter backstroke. Her time for the former event was 13 minutes, 18 seconds, while that for the latter race was 1 minute, 26 2-5 seconds.

Only a handful of fans took in the meet last night.

SWEEPING COMEBACK

The Hawaiian championship medley event saw Hamada stage a sweeping comeback after trailing by eleven meters on the first lap, which was breaststroke heat, to capture top honors.

Adolph Desha, lanky University of Hawaii star, got off to a brilliant start and frog-styled his way into a commendable lead in the first lap. However, as the natators swung into the backstroke, Hamada, Furu^{sho} and Martin, slowly but surely began cutting down the advantage held by Desha who managed to touch the Ewa end of the tank a couple of yards in advance.

Then in a furious battle on the home stretch, which was the freestyle lap, Hamada overtook the Rainbow natator in no time, as did Furu^{sho}.

At the 225-meter mark, Martin also swam past Desha.

Ahead of the field by a 15-meter margin, Hamada and Furu^{sho} put up a stirring struggle for first place, with the former finally winning out by several meters. Martin managed to hang on to the slight lead he had established at the outset of the final lap and breezed in third.

Hamada's time was 4 minutes 20 3-5 seconds.

Olga Clarke proved beyond any question or doubt that she is the best women swimmer in the territory by winning two titular events.

Only three swimmers answered the starter's gun in the 800-meter freestyle for women, they being, besides Miss Clarke, Rachel Howland of the University of Hawaii and Margaret Morse of the City-wide A. A.
