

O. C. C. Sets New 300 Meter Medley; Olga Clark Is High Point Scorer

Five men's events in the Hawaiian championship swims were held last night in the fourth and last series of meets at the War Memorial natatorium and three were captured by the Hui Makanis as they brought their brilliant performances to a close and copped the tournament by a high score against their nearest rivals.

The Hui Makanis rolled up 57 points in all while the Army in second with 13. University of Hawaii captured four and the 40 & 8 two points, respectively.

The only Hawaiian championship event which the Hui Makanis failed to capture last night was the Hawaiian championship diving affair and that contest belongs to nobody but Ed. Alvarez of the Army, peer of local divers, who again turned in a beautiful performance of assorted stunts.

Art Rutherford took second place and L. Gerywaiz, Army, won third place.

Record Broken

Only one Hawaiian record was broken and that by the Outrigger Canoe club women's team, which won the 300 meter medley relay in 4 minutes 49 3-5 seconds.

The Outrigger team which set up this new record was composed of Gladys Slaght, Betty Stevensen and Olga Clark. They took off five seconds from the old record.

Olga Clark, leading woman swimmer of the territory, again showed her class last night. Taking in the whole meet, she ran by herself a total of 55 points. These included five first places in individual swims and three first places on winning relay teams.

The Hui Makani victories, for first places last night in the Hawaiian championship events were the 200 meters backstroke, 100 meters freestyle, 800 meters freestyle and 800 meters freestyle relay.

Furusho Wins 100

The 100 meters freestyle Hawaiian championship for men, always one of the biggest events of any meet, was won by Maurice Furusho of the Makanis in 62 1-5 seconds. He finished two strokes ahead of his teammate, N. Hamada, while Waidlich of the Army.

The hard luck man of this race was W. Lake, Army's ace, who set a terrific pace and held about half a yard lead over the field. However, about eight yards near his goal, he got tangled in the ropes that divided the lanes and before he could do anything, his rivals had passed him.

It was one of the most thrilling races of the evening.

In the 800 meters freestyle relay Hawaiian championship for men the Hui Makanis won by 30 meters ahead of the Army, who came in second. The 40 & 8 finished third. The winning team composed of Pung, Martin, Hamada and Furusho.

Hamada Increases Lead

It was a close race in the first two laps, but in the third, Hamada
