

SAKAMOTO IS FIRST IN CASTLE SWIM AS 408 CLUB WINS MEET

American Legion Organization Takes Top Honors
Among Men with 45 Points—Outrigger Girls
Triumph—U. H. Sponsors Races

LED by Henry Sakamoto who won the blue ribbon Castle swim, the 40 and 8 natators, coached by Knute Cottrel, annexed top honors in the Waikiki Open water compet yesterday morning with 45 points.

Sakamoto was in rare form and at the finish was about twenty-five yards ahead of A. E. "Toots" Minville, winner of last year's race which was aged by the Outrigger Canoe Club for its members only. His time was 36 minutes 43 seconds.

Following the last race, cups and medals were presented to the winning clubs and swimmers on the beach. Knute Cottrel (40 and 8 coach), was presented with the men's team championship cup while Olga Clarke received the women's team titular trophy for the Outrigger club.

In the men's open race which got under way in the Castle Surf in front of the Elks club, Hui Makani's three entrants, Maurice Furusho, Noburu Hamada and Diamond Matin, were left behind when they failed to make an appearance at the starting point.

The committee in charge of the compet offered to take them out in its large canoe, but they preferred to paddle out to the start.

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
