

FINAL EVENT GIVES RAINBOWS EDGE IN INDOOR COMPET

Four Hawaiian Championships Staged But No Records Are Broken—Cottrell's Team Finishes Second

NEW faces came to the fore in the opening meet of the 1935 Hawaiian A. A. U. indoor swimming championships, sponsored by the Associated Students of the University of Hawaii in the Dean's pool last night, before an enthusiastic gathering.

By winning the final event on the program, the 300-yard medley through great anchoring on the part of Randall, the University mermer came from behind to take the lead by one point over Knute Cottrell's 40 & 8 paddlers for the first meet in the series of four by a 26 to 25 total.

Four Hawaiian championship events were on the program—the 220-yd. freestyle, and 100-yd. backstroke for women; the 500-yd. freestyle open for men and the men's Junior Hawaiian 100-yd. backstroke.

A surprise was furnished when Mildred Slaght, O. C. C., was forced to trail Margaret Morse, Unattached, in the freestyle and Rachel Howland, of the University squad, in the backstroke.

Mildred led Margaret by inches until the last twenty yards when the Unattached performer put on a burst of speed to win by two feet in 3 min., 2 2/5 seconds, while Betty Stevenson trailed in third place.

In the backstroke event, the promising University girl, Rachel Howland, led the former champion all the way, while Bessie Hemmings, of Roosevelt High, was third.

In the only men's open championship events, Elwin Doble of Ft. De Russy, representing the Army, won the Hawaiian 500-yd. freestyle event in 6 min., 33 2/5 seconds, finishing the length of the tank ahead of Wilbur Craw, University, and Eddie Nakamura of the 40 & 8 club. Doble is a newcomer to the islands but his showing last night should lead to greater deeds later on.

DESHA WINS

Swimming the backstroke with both arms flailing gave A. Desha, University, first place in the 100-yd. Junior Hawaiian championship. Second place also went to the University when Ben Hollinger nosed out Chiyozo Taira, 40 & 8.

The two relay events were close and had the crowd in a tantrum. Citywide won the 100-yard freestyle novice relay when Sonny Kaulana, starting in third place as anchor man, cut loose and nosed out Palama's anchor man, with 40 & 8 in third place. The Citywide quartet of novices, A. Carter, Joseph Miller, Joseph Puuloa and Sonny Kaulana, swimming in the order named.

In the 300-yd. medley relay for juniors, 40 & 8 took a lead in backstroke and breaststroke on some nice work by Tanaka and Abel Simeona, but Randall, swimming freestyle for the Deans, caught and passed Oscar Stewart of the 40 & 8 squad to come home in first place. Hollinger and Eto formed the remainder of the University trio.

The meet was well handled, with Arthur Fowlison doing the starting. The next meet will be held in the University pool next Friday night according to announcement made by "Pump" Searle who is directing the meets. Summaries:

Major Gen. James F. McKinley, adjutant general, said orders were prepared this afternoon assigning Jones to Oklahoma.

Jones coached at Louisiana State University until last fall when he quit rather than tolerate the interference of Senator Huey P. Long in the handling of the squad.

Picard Is Leading In Golf Play

Bobby Jones, Hopelessly Out of Masters Tourney at Augusta

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 5—Only five players stood within striking distance tonight of Henry Picard, whose round of 68 today resulted in a beautifully sustained scoring burst to hold him in the lead after the second round of the Masters' Open tournament.

Bobby Jones, golfing king of yesteryear was hopelessly out of the running. Though he carded a par 72 today, his 74 of yesterday gave him an aggregate of 146.

His score was fuzzy and far away compared to Gene Sarazen's 139, Mangrum's 139, Olin Dutra's 140, Johnny Hines' 140 and Craig Wood's 141.

Pennsylvania's Picard after two days of brilliant subpar golf aggregated 135, four strokes ahead of the best of them. Sarazen shot a 71 today.

Behind them followed Willie Goggin, Paul Runyan and Walter Hagen, all with 142s.

Lawson Little, national and British amateur champion, held the low amateur score with 146.

Wood, the big blond from New Jersey was shouldered out of third place by subpar shooters though he carded an even scratch of 72.

Goggin, San Francisco entry who led early starters yesterday, blew up today and carded a 74 after scoring 68 yesterday.

Jones thrilled the gallery with a semblance of a comeback in the early stages today when he sank a twisting, uphill 35-foot putt on the fifth hole. But after that he suffered a stroke relapse and bogged down with the middle field.

The 36-hole final will be played tomorrow.
