

University Leads 40 & 8 At End Of First Swimfest

Natators representing the University of Hawaii assumed a one point lead over the 40 & 8 club in the opening meet of the 1935 Hawaiian AAU indoor swimming championships held last night at the University of Hawaii tank.

Trailing the 40 & 8 clubsters by two points prior to the staging of the final event, the 300 yard medley, the Dean team, composed of B. Hollinger, Y. Eto and S. Randall, scooted to a thrilling victory over the 40 & 8 trio to cinch first place.

S. Randall, anchor man for the Deans, was actually the hero of the race. He overcame a good lead from the 40 & 8 swimmer, Oscar Stewart, and touched the wall with a few yards to spare.

Of the eleven events held, four were for Hawaiian championships. Winners of the championship races were:

100 yards backstroke for men junior: Adolph Desha, University of Hawaii.

220 yards freestyle for women open: Margaret Morse, unattached.

500 yards freestyle for men

open: Elwin O. Doble, Army.

100 yards backstroke for women open: Rachel Howland, University of Hawaii.

Mildred Slight Beaten

One of the biggest upsets of the evening was the defeat of Mildred Slight, OCC mermaid, by Margaret Morse, young unattached lassie, in the 220 yards freestyle for women open, Hawaiian championship.

Margaret showed surprising ability in staying up with the more experienced Mildred throughout the entire race. A more determined finish netted victory, Mildred tiring somewhat. The time for the race was 3 minutes 22-5 seconds.

Another impressive Hawaiian championship victory was that of Adolph Desha Dean merman, in the 100 yards backstroke for junior men. Desha sped to an easy victory in the time of 1 minute 10 3-5 seconds. Ben Hollinger, Desha's teammate, was second.
